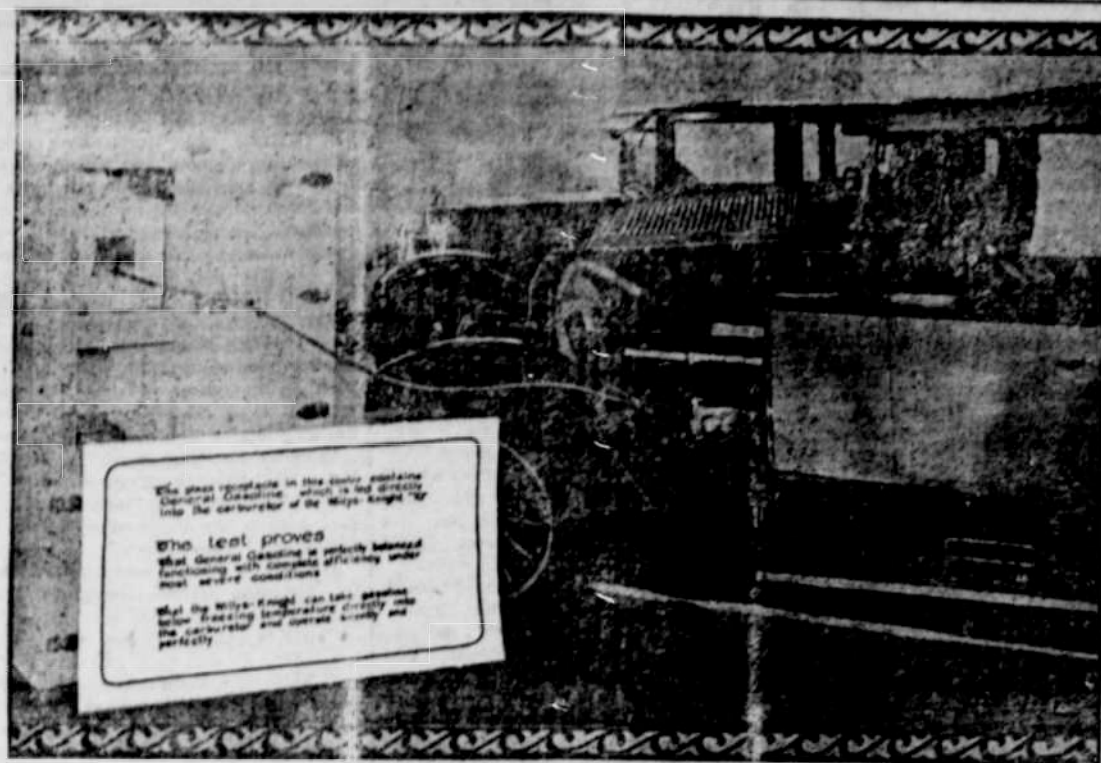
PROGRESS
