IT'S UP TO YOU

Under date of Saturday, August 17, 1912, "The Beaverton Owl," a newspaper then printed in Beaverton, carried the following news story in "preferred position" on its front page:

"Business Men

View Springs

Committee of 15 Make Trip
Last Friday 15 business men headed by mayor Pegg took a trip to the Springs. M. P. Cady, Frank Stroud and A. M. Kennedy giving the use of their autos and Boring Bros. their survey. Good water was found at both springs. "Everybody had a drink." On the home trip, Zimmerman spring was visited. Those making the trip were: Pegg, Hocken, Robison, Thys, Pike, Tucker, Summers, Hedge, F. W. Cady, M. P. Cady, Looney Stroud, Kennedy, Boring, Fisher Zimmerman. Springs looks most favorable, being only one mile from town, higher elevation and fine water."

You will notice that two men prominent in the city government now were among the party who went to view the springs. Why they did not go to work then and there and secure a supply of water for the town is somewhat of a story. It would seem that one who was then, and is now, a member of the Town government, was financially interested in land that was using water from the Springs for irrigation, or there were close friends or relatives of this party profiting by the water from the Springs.

There is a little talk of taking water from these springs now. It would seem that this party is no longer interested in these lands and is, urging the securing of water from that source for a supply for the town. What was not good for the town a decade and a half ago is just the thing now if only the citizens will vote a good big sum for the installation of the "system." This party helped to spend the money for the present system -- he sat in the council when the system was accepted -- he has been on the Council all the time -- even when the above-mentioned citizens visited the Springs -- last fall when the town was losing through the present system, more water than they were getting to use. He sat on the Council and asked, "What are ye goin' to do about it?"

Along back in October of 1923 there was circulated a letter addressed to "Mr. Voter and Taxpayer of Beaverton" which had figured out about where the then proposed Bull Run water system was going to lead us. It was put mildly when stated that the "net deficit in five years would be \$13,000." Five years would bring it to the close of 1928. We have not yet arrived there, but the net deficit came some time ago.

Mr. Otto Erickson, at that time Mayor, was the only one of the Town officials who did not favor Bull Run water. What are we going to do about it? It is up to the citizens of our town. The sooner we get "doin' somethin'" the better for all concerned.

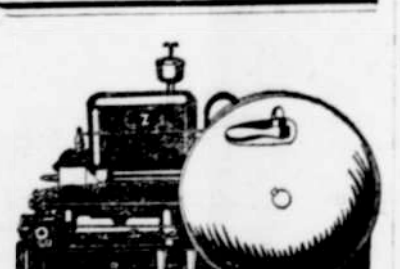
GRADE SCHOOL ITEMS

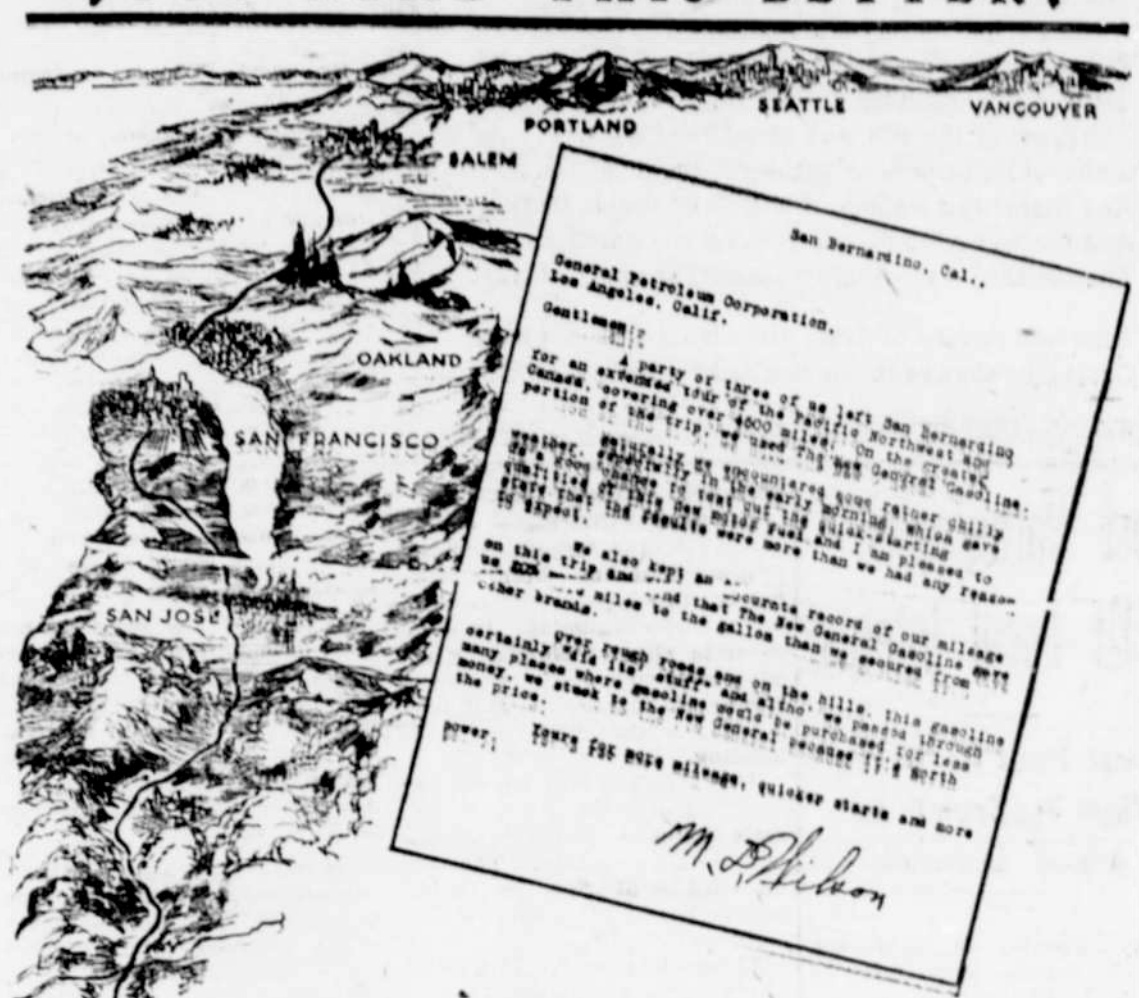
