OREGON TELEPHONE CO. TO ACCEPT "CODE" MESSAGES

Removal of all restrictions on the use of code in day and night letters accepted for transmission over lines of the Oregon Telephone Co. has been announced.

Heretofore night letters and day letters were accepted only if written in plain English. Code language was not permissible. These restrictions are lifted in the order issued by Earl W. Gates, general manager and the deferred day and night letter service at rates lower than the straight message rates is available for many classes of messages that have previously been confined to straight telegrams.
