The eighth grade offering was something entirely new, a shadow play, in which Fern Chinn, as reader, told the plot while various members of the class took part in the action. This number, which was under the direction of Miss Davies, was well worked out and brought a response from the audience.

The final operetta was the one staged by the fifth and sixth grades under the direction of Mrs. Dinwiddie, with Miss Crump at the piano. This was marked by some splendid acting and singing on the part of the leads, Thelma Tefft, Coral Stephens, and Wilbert Yeager. As the little princess was finally restored to her people thru the supremacy of the fairies, it took the grown-ups back to the time when these same fairies were the most important things in the world.

Mrs. Wetmore, cornet soloist, played two beautiful numbers during the evening; Maurice Manning Jr. gave some remarkable interpretations of piano music which were practically lost on a noisy crowd; and Naomi Brown gave some of her intangible readings.
