ROBINSON TO IMPROVE OLD SCHENBACHLA PLACE

The old Schenbachla place of nearly nine acres along Fanno Creek, a little way from Tigard, was purchased some time ago by W. D. Robinson and his son Beecher B. Robinson, and last year they built a new English bungalow of eight rooms, one of the best looking homes in their neighborhood. Part of the old house, which was built over forty years ago, still stands, but is being used this spring for a brooder house where over 1100 baby chicks are housed. Some of the old dwelling was torn down last year, and the balance of it will be wrecked for kindling wood this year and a modern brooder house will be erected. This place will be thoroughly irrigated. A concrete dam has already been completed at Fanno Creek and the Robinsons will force their supply of water up where they want it and every foot of the place can be properly irrigated and will be made to produce most anything that can be grown in western Oregon.

The elder Robinson is an old hand at irrigation, having put in many years at Halfway, in Baker county, Oregon before coming here, where men have a chance to learn all about irrigation, if they mean to farm right. They are now featuring White Leghorns mostly, but have quite a number of Buff Orpingtons. One good feature of their place is that it is irrigated and has a nice moderate slope to the southeast, which is fine for a poultry, berry or nut farm. One can see, in the construction of that old Schenbachla house, the result of careful workmanship and good material. Houses in those days were built to last and not merely to sell. But, after all, what is left of the old house has become somewhat of an eyesore, as compared to the present well made house situated only a few feet to the north of it.
