SPEEDWAY FOR DOGS TO BE BUILT AT WITCH HAZEL

D. L. Clough of Portland is constructing a race track for dogs on the Witch Hazel farm. Mr. Clough is the owner of twelve Whippet dogs, one of which took the prize at the dog show at Portland.

The speed of one of his swiftest is two hundred yards in 12 1/2 seconds.

Many Winter Jobs FOR ELECTRIC FAN

A recent survey of domestic applications of electricity shows eight outstanding winter uses of the electric fan:

1. To dry wet shoes and stockings quickly.

2. To distribute heat through room by air current.

3. To hasten cooling of fresh cake or pie.

4. To dehydrate fruits and vegetables.

5. To remove dampness from clothing after ironing.

6. To supply draft to speed up furnace fire.

7. To vitalize air in room when windows must be kept shut.

8. To blow air onto coal-closets to prevent collection of moisture and to discourage moths.

The first electric fans were made in 1881 and were rented for \$15 a season plus the charge for current. They were built without guards and caused many wounds when curious strangers took their fingers into the whirling blades. A modern 12 inch fan can be operated for half a cent an hour with current at ten cents a kilowatt hour.

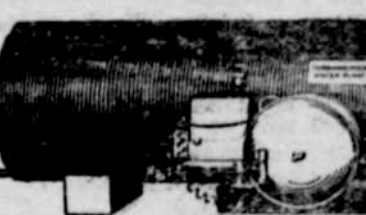
