When you are asked for a bit of news by a reporter of an out-of-town paper, has it ever occurred to you that Your Home Town paper would like to be the first to print the home news?

Then have you ever considered the doubtful value of a news story printed in an out-of-town paper? How much of the Kelso News do you read, or of the Oregon City news or of the news from any other place but that little place you call Your Own? The large Metropolitan papers are printing the report of the McGee trial but how much publicity is Hillsboro getting? You will note that a story like that never gets under the head of the small town in the big dailies. Why? Just because the big dailies don't care a rap about the small town except as they can capitalize on that small town's ambition to be seen alongside of the big city's stuff—like the frog in the fable.

Who reads the stories under the small town's heading in the big papers? Just the people of that particular small town, not the people of the big city or of any other small town.

What are we driving at, anyway? Just this. The fellow who prints the news from your town under your town's name in a big daily is doing it so as to sell his paper in your town and for no other reason. And every time you allow a news item to be printed in one of the Portland dailies, you make it more difficult for a citizen of your town, one of your neighbors to sell his paper in your town and his family to make an honest living.

Now we know that a decade and a half behind the desk in front of a number of children has caused us to some way take on all unconsciously an attitude of forcing our opinions upon others. But we don't feel that way. We would only like to call your attention to these few thoughts. You may not agree with them. But think them over, anyway. And believe us when we say that they are not prompted by any thoughts of anything in the world but for what is best for Beaverton. We live here. We've seen a lot of this glorious land of The Free, the best country that God ever made, and for a place to live Beaverton suits us better than any other. And we even want to help it to be better than it is. And we believe we can.

One of our neighbors said he didn't quite understand what we were driving at last week—that we left our paragraph about Civil Government unfinished. He thought we should do so, or what the Council is supposed to do.

Let us say right here that it is not for us to dictate to the Mayor or the Council what they should or should not do. The people of this Town have put these men in office and it is only up to the Review to let the people know what has been done.

Let Mussolini do the dictating if he wants to, we don't want that sort of a job.

In a talk with one of the "water committee," composed of Councilmen Wilson and Bishop, it was learned that the difference between the readings of the Master Meter and the meter at the Reservoir has been reduced to about 3,700 cu. ft. a day, and that leaks are being found in the water pipe and are being repaired as fast as possible. Last fall there was a difference of about 11,000 cu. ft. per day. Some progress, if we are permitted to remark.

present. It was while at Manhattan that he supplied a poor chap with the materials to make violins with and it was this same chap, Art. Ransour, who gave Mr. Haulenbeck his first lessons in violin making and also let him into some of the secrets of master violin makers. One of the elements entering into the making of good violins consists of tuning the separate pieces that go to make up the completed instrument, and another is the sort of varnish to be used in finishing the wood.

There are a great many of these little particulars but the two are of the more important ones. Young Haulenbeck's musical training and natural "ear" for tonal qualities fitted him for making fine instruments. He took up the work as a hobby.

In former years it was the violins were better made from maple for the back and sides and with a spruce top. It has since been discovered that violins made in very ancient times were formed from myrtlewood with spruce tops and it is this sort that has occupied the attention of our neighbor.

This myrtlewood grew in ancient Egypt and the only other place it has been found in its native state is in the Coos Bay region in southwest Oregon.

While not holding record prices which are usually paid not for a new instrument but for old instruments which have an other value from associations or other reasons, the maker, perhaps, instruments made from myrtlewood sell for as high as \$500.00 each or even more—not at all a bad price for a new instrument.

Experienced teachers of these instruments have chosen violins made here in Beaverton in preference to those costing \$150 though Mr. Haulenbeck doesn't ask anything like that for his instruments. One such, space will not allow the whole catalog, is being used at Rochester, Wn. which is highly recommended by its owner. And the residents of this section have often danced to the music of one of Mr. Haulenbeck's instruments and a very few thought or even knew that the fine tones of music that caused the toes to trip so lightly were coming from a violin made right at home here.

The photo we have reproduced here shows Mr. C. A. Haulenbeck holding one of his instruments in his hand while in the other hand is a silver loving cup presented to him a little more than a year ago when he played in a radio contest and was adjudged the winner though playing with some of the leading violinists in the country, one of the leading competitors being none other than Chas. Labo, a violinist of nationally known ability.

The picture does not do Mr. Haulenbeck justice for it was taken in the bright sunlight. He does not look in life nearly so old as the picture indicates.
