

Play Ball!

The ball game Sunday on the Payne field brought out a very considerable crowd but there would probably have been many more had it not been about the first time that driving made one more comfortable than staying in the house or sitting still out of doors. Wolff hit to second and was thrown out. Sorenson and Jamison both fanned. Third Inning: Doane out on a short fly to first. Delplanché hit safe but was caught off second by pitcher. F. Turk got a hit but the side was out when L. Turk grounded out to pitcher. Hoffman led off with a hit, but was caught napping after stealing second. Davies grounded to short and was thrown out at first. Summers fanned, retreating the side.

PRUNE GROWERS WILL MEET AT CORVALLIS

A convention of one hundred Pacific Northwest producers of dried prunes will be held at the Oregon Agricultural college June 28 and 29, to formulate a program of action based upon the report of the recent prune studies conducted by the U. S. Bureau of Economics, according to plans announced today.

The growers will choose delegates to this convention at a series of community meetings to be held during April and May in dried prune producing centers of Oregon and Clark county, Washington. The important recommendations submitted by the Department of Agriculture will be summarized at the meetings by C. J. Hurd and C. L. Long of the Extension Service, who have been provided with a special set of charts and lantern slides dealing with the prune survey, compiled by the Bureau of Economics. It is expected that B. H. Critchfield who conducted the survey will be present at the Convention of One Hundred in June.

The California-Oregon Power Co. at Medford has 500 men working on the Prospect river power project.
Nineteen men planted 140,000 seedling fir trees in one day at the U. S. Wind River station near Hood River.
The First Presbyterian church congregation are going to put up a \$125,000 building this season at Salem.
Vernonia is building a combination elementary and high school building that is said to cost \$115,000.
The Southern Pacific has purchased eighteen acres in the Eastmoreland district in Portland for development.
A contract has been let for building the Salmon River cut-off highway from Willamina to the coast.
