1854 ISSUE OF N. Y. PAPER SHOWS SPIRIT OF TIMES

The Germans were out in procession in large numbers today in a procession with music, and banners bearing inscriptions against the Nebraska bill. "Softs and Hards—The Soft Shell committee of Tammany Hall in the city of New York are reported in the city papers as in favor of the Nebraska bill. Many of the prominent Hard Shell Democrats in the State denounce this proposition to extend Slavery as an outrage on the rights of free labor, as a dishonorable violation of the Compromise of 1850." There are also a number of editorials in which the editor berates the Southern states for wishing to extend the institution of Slavery into the new states of the West.

An interesting sidelight on the time was listed under the head, "Kentucky's Tribute To The Memory of Henry Clay—The present session of the Kentucky Legislature is the first that has assembled since the death of Mr. Clay. The death of the distinguished statesman was noticed by the passage of appropriate resolutions, accompanied by eloquent speeches eulogistic of the deceased patriot."

The sewing machine had been recently invented and was being brought into general use, which elicited the displeasure of the tailoring fraternity as evidenced by the following note: "The journeymen Tailors of Hamilton have struck and demanded that the use of the sewing machine shall be abandoned."
