Home Economics Expert Demonstrates To Large Class

A large audience greeted Ros Bartlett, Home Economics expert of the Portland Gas and Cook Company, on Tuesday afternoon in the opening class of the Review Free Cooking school in the Beaver Theatre. Mrs. Bartlett was well known to many of those present, having conducted a very successful class here last year.

Jiffy Cake, the opening number, gave the cooking course of study a good start. With a cup of liquid consisting of melted butter, two egg yolks, one egg white and milk, a cup of sugar and 1 1/2 cups of flour, this particular kind of cake was more than a theory. Different from most cakes, all the ingredients were beaten and combined at once, saving time and the use of extra kitchen utensils. Baking in two small layers required 20 minutes, the automatic heat regulator of the oven taking care of the temperature so that Mrs. Bartlett had time to prepare the icing and do other things as well.

Beaverton Hi Track Team Wins Honors

Local Squad Highest Scorer Of Wash. County Schools At Pacific U. Meet

Beaverton high school won third place in the annual interscholastic track meet held by Pacific University at Forest Grove last Saturday, May 7.

Eight schools, Hillsboro, Salem, Corvallis, Silverton, Woodburn, Independence, Forest Grove and Beaverton.

What pleases the Beaverton team most is that they received more than as many as all the other high schools in Washington county. Beaverton got 24 points, Hillsboro 19 1/2, and Forest Grove 1.

Clyde Edwards from the local school tied the record for the 100-yard dash at 10 1-5 seconds in the mile race James Welsh took first; in the 120-yd. high hurdles, Alden Barron, fourth; in the 440-yd. dash Chas. Brandt took first; in the 220-yard low hurdles Clyde Edwards took 4th; in the pole vault Chester Britton tied for first with Hogue of Corvallis; and in the broad jump Chas. Brandt took 2nd, and in the 100-yard dash Clyde Edwards took first.

Eight boys from Beaverton took part in the meet, James Welsh, Alden Barron, Chas. Brandt, Clyde Edwards, Chester Britton, Raymond Harrison, Gayford Wilson, and Paul Wurth. Harrison competed in the shot put and discus, Wilson in the pole vault, and Wurth in the high jump.

Corvallis high school took the most points in the meet, Salem second, and Beaverton 3rd. A remarkable showing when we remember that the local school is without a field to put a team to practice in.

Come and join in all of our good times. We want you and you are welcome.

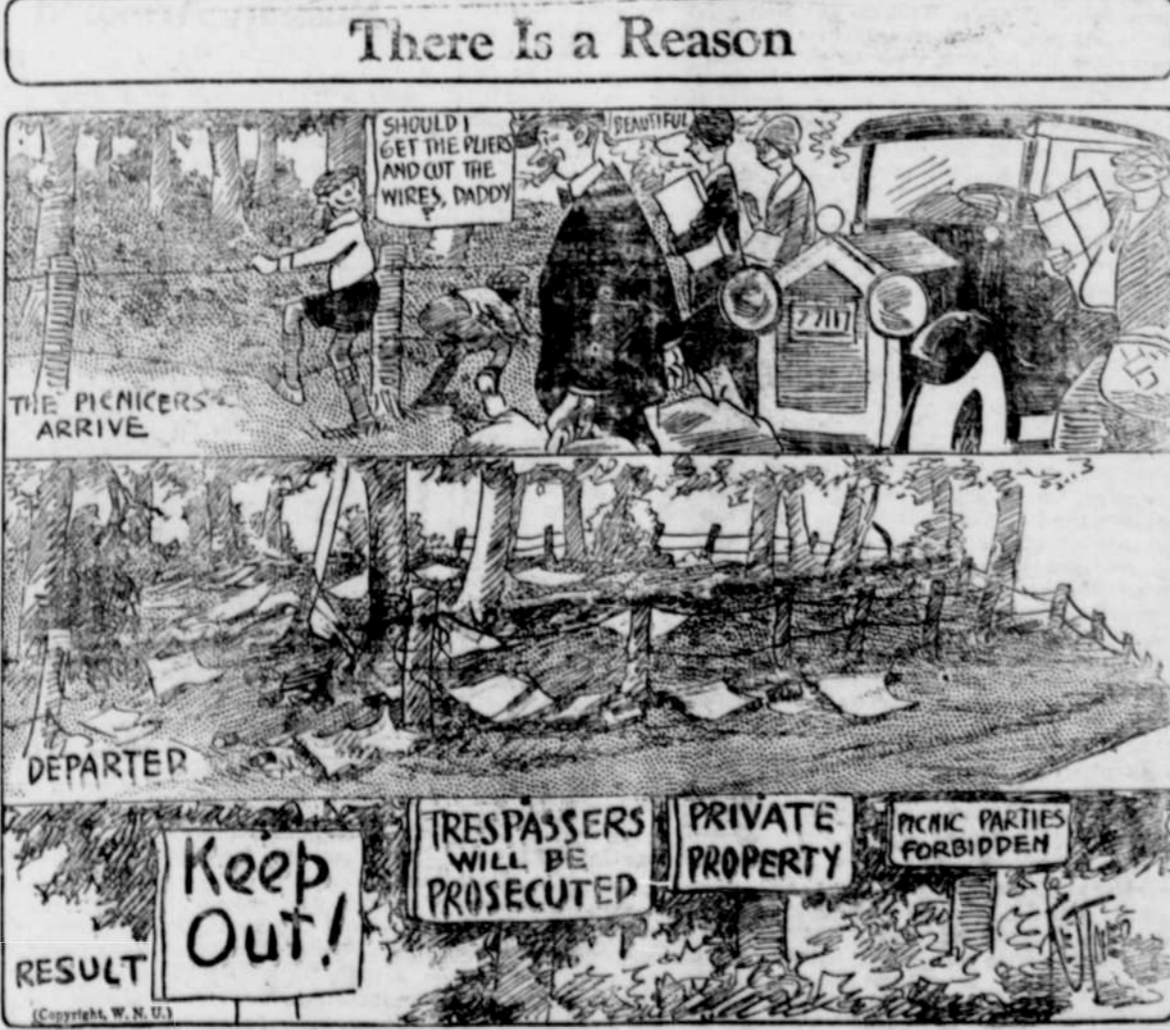
Beaverton Will Enter Squad at O.A.C. Meet
