BANKERS HELPING

Three banks in South Carolina have
inaugurated a plan to provide free
rent for two years a centrally located
place to be used by the farmers of
Greenville and neighboring counties
for the purpose of establishing a
creamery, a canning factory and a
farm woman's club. The idea is to get
the farmers to raise livestock, to raise
their own food and feed and to have
something extra to sell. The canning
factory is intended to utilize the sur-
plus garden and fruit products, and
the club rooms for getting the support
and co-operation of the farm women.

Georgia bankers have made great
trides in furthering a diversified
arming program the past year. They
induced farmers to sow fifty-five car-
loads of vetch seed, furnished local
prizes in eighty counties for the corn
contest, the state prize of \$1,000 being
furnished by a bank in Atlanta. A
banker-farmer alfalfa demonstration
was held at the college and attended
by 250 bankers and farmers. Alfalfa
acreage has increased from 1,500 to
5,000, the demonstration being cred-
ited with 50 per cent of this increase.
This year the state has produced 12,
000,000 more bushels of corn than last
year, has sold 50 cars of truck, \$2,000,
000 worth of pecans, and has produced
150,000,000 pounds of meat and enough
corn and hay for its own use.

ALOHA PRECINCT VOTES FOR INCOME TAX

Unlike our well known sub-
urb, the city of Portland, Aloha
felt very kindly toward the in-
come tax at the recent spe-
cial election. In the final abun-
dations the count stood 67 yes
to 30 no; a more than two to
one victory. The county salary
measure also took this precinct
by a slight majority. The rest
of the bills went very much as
the rest of the state. The final
count follows: negro suff-
rage clause, yes 65; no 23;
criminal information bill, yes
61; no 24; Portland school tax,
yes 34, no 37; Legislators' pay
raise, yes 27, no 56; Voters'
registration, yes 61, no 25;
County salary amendment, yes
61, no 28; Veterans' Memorial,
yes 24, no 60; Tax limitation,
yes 21, no 67; Income tax, yes
67, no 30; Property assessment
tax, yes 41, no 42; Nestucca
Bay closing, yes 63, no 24.
