

PAGEANT-PLAY TO BE CHAUTAUQUA FEATURE

Featuring a pageant-play of old Oregon, "The Old Frontier," the Willamette Valley Chautauqua for 1927 will be held in its Gladstone park, located between Oregon City and Portland, July 12 to 24 inclusive.

It is planned to make this pageant-play a permanent feature of the Chautauqua, and this year being produced Wednesday and Thursday, July 13 and 14, James W. Evans, a professional pageant producer is the author and the director, and he brings upon the stage all the men who were noted in the days from 1805 almost to the present time. A total of 250 persons will take part.

The fine chautauqua park is well suited for this production, being in the wild state created by nature. The big trees and great rocks will make a fine background for the tale of the pioneers who came to this section and made of it the paradise that it now is in which to live.

Opening day, July 12, will witness the appearance of the 60-piece Luther College concert band. On Wednesday and Thursday occurs the big pageant. Friday speeches will be made by Congressman W. C. Hawley, former Governor Walter M. Pierce and United States Senator Charles L. McNary. On Saturday 12 vaudeville teams will compete for the favor of the audiences, six in the afternoon and six in the evening. Sunday there will be preaching by Dr. Charles F. Wishart at 2:00 p. m. and by Dr. E. L. House at 8:00 p. m. At 4:00 p. m. this day the Mount Olivet Chorus will give a concert of negro spirituals and plantation melodies.

The second week will see a political debate Monday at 2:15 p. m. between Elton Watkins, democrat, and B. F. Mulkey, republican, on the subject, "Resolved: That the Republican Party will be defeated in the next Presidential Election." In the evening an Eastern company will produce the play "The Fool." Wednesday there will appear the Smith-Spring-Holmes orchestra quintet, in which are two nationally known composers, Clay Smith and G. E. Holmes. Thursday, July 21, will be a veritable Indian day, with the Haskell, Oklahoma, Indian band, supplemented by the Chemawa Indian school band, with hundreds of Indians of this section present to see their folks perform. Ned Woodman, cartoonist, will also appear the afternoon of this day.

Friday, July 22, the Allpress Trio will hold their boards, with Dr. Alexander Cairns lecturing. Saturday, Earl Scott will give Scotch specialties in the afternoon and the big play, "Applesauce," will be produced in the evening. Sunday, the last day, will see the appearance of Rev. Wm. A. (Billy) Sunday at 2:15 p. m. At 4 p. m. there will be a sacred concert by the Chautauqua choir, which will have been built up by Charles B. Clark, song leader. At 7:30 a religious pageant will be produced by the new school for religious leadership that is being established this year by the Oregon Council of Religious Education.

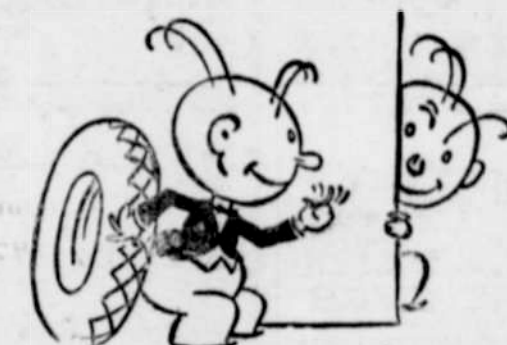
