Rose Schindler filed suit for divorce against Fred Schindler, charging cruel and inhuman treatment. The couple were married at Vancouver, February 14, 1920. The plaintiff asks that she be given \$15 a month alimony and that her maiden name, Rose Clark, be restored to her.

Wilson Campbell is asking the court for judgment for an amount of \$5,500 against H. D. Schmetzer and J. H. Bellis, timber contractors. Campbell is the partner of J. M. Lockwood, who owns a saw mill five miles south of Hillsboro on the Holter place. In the suit Campbell alleges that the defendants failed to deliver 20,000 feet of logs per day as contracted and that he was forced to shut down the mill because the logs were not delivered. The amount asked is for damages and expense.

ORDERS HANDED DOWN

Washington county, which is named as plaintiff in three suits for the collection for back taxes, was given judgment and orders for collection in three cases. The defendants and the amounts are: Page Patton, \$125.81 taxes, \$57.60 interest and \$12.50 costs; William Elert, \$95.62 taxes, \$17.78 interest, and \$12.70 costs; C. L. Brown and J. H. Bolz, \$76.40 taxes, \$12.25 interest and \$10.00 costs.

Nine orders for the dismissal of tax suits which had been settled outside of court were also issued. The defendants were Philip White, D. McBride, Lee Ginn, G. Henderson, Ben Segel, Berna Green, J. H. Volz, and G. Kins.

An order for the release of personal property belonging to Fred P. Lyons was issued in the case of A. L. Moth versus Fred P. Lyons. Because Emmett Notes went swimming in Dairy Creek without a bathing suit on, he was sentenced to serve a year in the County Jail and fined the cost of the court by Judge Geo. Bagley Saturday. Notes waived grand jury action and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of indecent exposure on information furnished by the district attorney.

Minnie New was granted a divorce Saturday from Jeff New. She was also given her maiden name, Minnie Sears. Eva Downs was granted a divorce from W. W. Downs by a decree issued Saturday by the Circuit Court.

Sanford O. Olson was ordered to pay \$75.00 attorney fee and \$37.00 suit money to his former wife, Alys Olson, who has filed suit for divorce. An order of judgment was given Washington County for the collection of \$815.52 and \$33.83 interest against Fred P. Lyons.

STATE OF OREGON IS FACING TAX PROBLEM

Probability of elaboration of the original intent of a resolution adopted at the last session of the legislature is indicated by Speaker Carkin of the house of representatives. H. R. No. 21 authorized the appointment of a Property Tax Relief commission "with power and authority to make such investigation as the members thereof may deem necessary for the relief of the burdensome tax imposed upon real property in the home that some plan may be formulated where-through suggested legislative all financial requirements of one state government may be hereafter met by indirect methods of taxation, and direct levy on property for state purposes may be done away with as is done in a number of other states."

Speaker Carkin now proposes to go beyond the appointment of a committee of five originally contemplated, and include in the personnel of the committee as many as twenty members of the state for the purpose of probing into the whole scheme of state taxation, and giving representation to all major interests as agriculture, industry, banks, public utilities, lumbering, livestock, horticulture, and mercantile interests. The enlarged committee would be requested to survey the needs of the state and to study possible economies with the object of reducing expenditures where practicable. While the people have rejected the tax proposals submitted by the last legislature, the problem that confronts the state has not been solved, and it is anticipated that a representative group may agree upon plans that will be satisfactory to a majority of the people and that will attract support from the next legislature. It has been pointed out that in California no direct property tax is levied for state purposes, and it is admitted that in Oregon several classes of intangibles still escape taxation.

WHEN TO BEGIN GETTING READY FOR SCHOOL

As soon as a child begins to walk the first steps should be taken to prepare him for the hazard of going to school. The age period between two and seven years is one of tremendous importance when a child's future health and happiness are to be considered. This age has been sadly neglected in the past, and vital statistics show that one-third of all deaths occur under the age of six years. These years determine a child's future prospects much as the foundation and frame determine a structure. The law of growth makes these the most formative of all years. Much care is given to the baby, but the mother too frequently forgets that the runabout child is probably in need of greater attention than the nursing baby. The child is left too much to his own device. No greater mistake could be made because this is the most important period in the child's life.

Parents must remember that they are accountable for the normal development of their children. Children should be carefully prepared for school life. The preschool child is in need of expert advice. This is the period when an intelligent and scientific examination can do much to safeguard its future health. An expert will be able to detect defects in their first stages. A correction of these defects may make success out of a child that was doomed to failure and chronic suffering.

School teachers find that the children are handicapped because they have been neglected at home. The parent has failed to realize that the age from two to six should be one of preparation. In these years habits of right thinking and living must be formed. The child's physical progress should be followed by regular examinations of at least height, weight, and mental development. When physical defects are found they should be remedied.

The preschool child should have well regulated hours of play, rest, sleep, and meals. Health habits, such as bathing frequently, cleaning of teeth, outdoor living; liberal use of fruits, whole grains, and vegetables and drinking plenty of water are necessary to insure his future life and prosperity.
