FEEDING THE BODY

An inquirer wants to know why a heavy six o'clock dinner does more harm than the same amount taken at noon, or even at breakfast.

Well, my dear, if we were simply filling a bushel basket with provender, it would not make the slightest difference when it was done, so far as the contents are concerned; let us look at the thing intelligently.

The entire body, from its previous night's rest, is in its highest state of efficiency in the early morning; a good breakfast will be taken care of properly. At noon, healthy stomachs are, say, eighty per cent capable; a good, round dinner may be taken with comfort and benefit. By evening, however, the body is ready for rest—not forced re-exertion.

Digestion may be placed at ten per cent efficiency at 6 p. m. Only ten per cent of the big meal taken at that time, is properly saturated with digestive fluids; what happens? The mass passes on into the intestine, to be seized by the greedy absorbers, no matter in what state it is; in this absorption does not reject anything absorbable.

The result is that the improperly prepared juices enter the blood stream totally foreign to it; then, stupor, headache, loss of appetite for the breakfast meal, weakness, mental inefficiency, 'blood-pressure' and the like develop—the final chapter will be written in an attack of cerebral hemorrhage or 'heart failure' anywhere from 'fifty-five to sixty-five years of age.

We can not evade the fact that the night was provided for rest from the mental and physical exertion of the day. The digestion must rest likewise—at night. We should consume not more than ten per cent of our daily ration at the evening meal. Otherwise we pay the penalty in shortened time of living. I have observed phenomena of this kind too long and too frequently to be very much mistaken. Turning nights into days is one of the chief errors of mankind, whatever the reason given in extenuation.
