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Good Sires Improve The Herd

THE way to greater prosperity on the farm is being pointed out by the activities of Cow Improvement and Testing Associations all over the country. Efforts have been directed, particularly, towards improvements in both herds and sires.

Remarkable successes have been recorded, the most recent coming from a progressive mid-western Association. One of the herd sires in the association has 15 daughters (in 6 different herds) averaging 471 pounds of butter fat each. A son of this sire has 5 daughters (3 yearlings and 2 two-year-olds) whose average production is 41 pounds of fat per month.
