LAND SET ASIDE AS GAME PRESERVE

The new bird refuge and game preserve, organization of which has just been completed, and which is now being posted by the State Game commission, comprises a total of 830 acres, centering about St. Mary's station on the Oregon Electric railroad a mile west of Beaverton. The reserve includes all the St. Mary's Institute property, and the holdings of seven adjoining property owners; they are L. P. Byrne, Charles Gray, Harold Bedford, Viola Orthel, Isabel McManus, G. Anderson, and William P. Strandborg.

The new reserve runs along the West Side loop of the Pacific highway, on either side of the same, and through to the old Hillsboro county road on the south.

The citizens signing their lands into reserve, state that the action seemed necessary to protect themselves from damage to property, continued an-

noyance throughout the hunting season, and even menace to personal safety because of the reckless shooting and lack of any respect or consideration for the rights of others on the part of that class of hunters who disgrace and bring reproach upon sportsmen of the better class. In their lust for bagging the limit of pheasant and quail, these hunters have carried nippers, and ruthlessly cut through wire fences, leaving gaps through which deer have escaped; they have disregarded all notices of trespass and verbal warnings and have added insolence to injury. They have fired at pheasants against the protest of indignant owners, in gardens and back yards, and so reckless has been their shooting that parents of the community have been compelled to keep their children within their houses or dooryards to insure their safety. The children in the St. Mary's orphanage have for several seasons past, been deprived of their rightful playgrounds throughout the hunting season, as it has been necessary to keep them within the buildings or inside the hedged yards adjacent. One housewife, working on her rear porch, was showered last season with splinters shot from the roof above her, by a pheasant hunter.

The spirit shown by hunters guilty of such trespass on the rights of others, according to a statement from the State Game Commission office, is rapidly causing much good hunting territory to be thrown into reserve.
