The Salem city budget for 1928 is set at \$331,505.

A big doughnut factory has been opened at Corvallis.

Silverton has nearly \$2,000,000 deposits in two banks.

The Westport Theatre is being remodeled and improved.

Condon growers' holiday turkey sales amounted to \$8,000.

Roseburg growers will ship 600 cars of broccoli this winter.

Klamath Falls laid 140,000 yards of paved streets during 1927.

The Irondyke mill at Baker will be operated under a receivership.

Salem plans three additional fire stations for adequate fire protection.

The contract has been awarded for a new \$100,000 hotel at Newport.

A \$50,000 bond issue will rebuild the waterworks at Forest Grove.

The Jewett and Yellowhorn mines at Grants Pass will be operated this year.

Burns is expecting to get all night long distance telephone service soon.

The Plute Indian school at Burns is to have an \$8,000 federal appropriation.

Unusual Weather Reaches Beaverton

Silver Thaw Breaks Trees and Electric Light Wires In Washington County

The past week end has been one of the most disagreeable so far as weather conditions are concerned, that has been experienced in the Pacific Northwest in years. The temperature ranging down to 14 degrees above zero was reported in the Tualatin valley, which of itself is enough to drive native Beavertonians to cover. Add to this low temperature a wind that at real North Dakota blizzard, accompanied by flying snow, made the opening days of 1928 a time that will be remembered.

On the heels of the light snow came about four inches of ice, or rather, frozen rain drops, which weighted down buildings, clinging to electric wires, and in other ways made its presence obnoxious.

The wind abated somewhat Sunday night, but it was not until Tuesday that weather conditions assumed anything like normal in this section of the country.

We are informed that immense snow slides have covered railroads leading out of Portland to amazing depths. For the first time we have seen snow plows on the highways of Oregon. Washington county court sent out graders, which made very good improvised plows. Instead of drawing the snow into the center they pushed it out onto one side. In Multnomah county the graders were busy in Portland, and little work was done on the roads outside of town.

The wind blew the snow in under the rafters so that many houses that was supposed to be weatherproof leaked melted snow, and the temperature arose in the attic so that the white feathers turned to snow.
