WORST OF ALL CRIMES. THE MICROSCOPE. PAGAN RELIGIONS. THE KING'S PRAYER BOOK.

California and the whole country are shocked by a dreadful kidnapping and murder in Los Angeles. The unhappy father, obeying the orders of the kidnaper, handed him \$1,500 in gold certificates, and in return received part of the body of his twelve-year-old daughter, dreadfully mutilated.

The worst of crimes is kidnapping, since it inflicts upon fathers and mothers torments most horrible. That crime should be punished with utmost severity, and when guilt is certain with no delay.

Dr. William J. Mayo, one of the famous brothers, says science learns more about diseases from the microscope than in any other way. Man's brain is a "visual organ," and must see, to know.

The introduction of the microscope by the Jansses, late in the sixteenth century, has done more to advance learning than any other agent, says Dr. Mayo.

Real learning owes more to Galileo's introduction of the telescope, at the beginning of the seventeenth century, than to the microscope. Seeing the germs that cause disease is important, but less so than seeing distant stars and nebulae.

Perhaps, as the great German scientist Haeckel suggested, men of the future will train one eye for telescope, the other for microscope work, the two eyes combined dealing with the real world about us.

BRIGHT SEED CATALOGS

Beautiful seed catalogs full of promise usually arrive at this time of year when frost and snow hold away in the garden. Nevertheless, this is none too soon to be thinking of early crop growing, says A. G. B. Bouquet, professor of vegetable gardening, who is already talking with his radio audience over KOAC about spring planting. He is a professor at the Oregon State Agricultural college.

"Growing a few early vegetables is a useful way of making a little extra cash during the fore part of the growing season," says Professor Bouquet. "Some vegetable crops grow rapidly and are ready for harvesting and marketing in a comparatively short time. Although the year is just started it is not too early for you to be figuring on what you might grow for profit just as soon as the season opens for planting."

"Spinach, radish, lettuce, early cabbage, peas, early root crops, such as turnips, beets, and carrots are vegetables which are easy to grow and generally in good demand. All of these vegetables are hardy and not injured by light frosts and may be planted as soon as the weather shows actual signs of becoming spring-like."

Two methods used to control maggots in radishes are the use of cheesecloth screen over the beds, and the spraying of the soil with corrosive sublimate, 1 ounce to 10 or 12 gallons of water after seedling, he explained. Peas make a good first early vegetable both for home use and for market. The market wants large, dark green, well-filled pods. They need moderately rich soil and early seeding.

"Now is the time to decide on the crops you are figuring on planting, and the amount of each. Do this considering carefully, for you do not want to waste your time, money, or energy, growing produce that you cannot use and Professor Bouquet.

FARM REMINDERS

Oregon fruit growers contemplating the use of oil spray for the control of San Jose scale are advised by the experiment station at Oregon State Agricultural college to spray during moderate weather. Application of oil to fruit trees during or immediately before freezing weather results in serious injury and even death of the trees.

In buying land plaster the grower will find a variation in price per ton of the various brands on the market. This is due to the fact that the material varies in percentage of calcium sulphate. Land plaster is most economically bought on the basis of the amount of calcium sulphate contained. A brand analyzing 80% is worth but 8-9 of what a brand analyzing 90% is worth, the college experiment station at Corvallis explains.

Station reports indicate that garden slugs will probably be abundant.

about in Oregon this spring and do much damage. Hard freezing is not particularly harmful to slugs, as they may freeze, "come to," and continue to do damage. They also stand high water unless washed away. To protect the plants, spray with bordeaux, followed by a bait consisting of chopped lettuce leaves or dried carrots sprinkled with calcium arsenate.

DRUGGISTS' LOAN FUND AIDING MANY STUDENTS

Oregon State Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 26.—"Ask and ye shall receive" is the biblical admonition, but it is not quite that simple for students who ask loans of the new fund established by the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association to assist deserving students in the school of pharmacy here.

While the fund has grown from the initial gift of \$1000 made by John P. Allen of Corvallis, to a total of \$11,175 in a little more than two years, the amount is not large enough yet to permit loans to any but the most deserving. Eleven such loans have just been granted, aggregating \$1150.

When a student applies for a loan he is questioned regarding his expenses. If he is found to be running a car for pleasure he either gets rid of the car or does without the loan. Applicants are advised to carry life insurance as a protection for the donors of the fund, and are expected to do some outside work.

To date 35 loans totalling \$3339 have been granted, enabling many students to complete their studies. The fund is irrevocable and is handled in co-operation with, but separate from the regular student loan fund.

The growth of cover crops in Oregon orchards can be increased with a top dressing of a soluble nitrogen fertilizer such as sodium nitrate or sulphate of ammonia. It is applied some time during the month of February at the rate of 100 to 200 pounds per acre.
