An eight-year-old boy with a freckled face and a smile which shows four teeth missing in the front of his mouth is the happiest youngster in Portland. Every Saturday afternoon he bundles up in a sheepskin coat, a pair of goggles and a helmet to take his weekly flying lesson. He is Jack Kegerreis, the youngest flying student in America, and the son of J. Kegerreis, general manager of the Rankin School of Flying of Portland, Oregon.

Jack is a lively boy for his age. He is adept at shooting, boxing, swimming, and is a first-rate student in the third A of a grammar school here. He knows a lot about flying from the dozens of pilots who talk to him and to the conversations of his father.

The course which Jack will take will extend over two years, but long before he is old enough to receive a license he will be able to handle an airplane in the air. The flying course was a birthday present from his father, who plans to give him an airplane on his eighteenth birthday.

His most treasured possession is a menu autographed by Colonel Lindbergh. Last week he had another thrill when he talked for a long time to Eddie Rickenbacker, America's foremost ace in the air.
