Pillows may be conveniently carried in a rear trunk or in a sack on a rear trunk rack; many prefer to keep them in the car to increase the ease of lounching.

The advantages of sleeping in a closed car are numerous, as the windows may be arranged to give good ventilation without drafts and complete protection is afforded in any kind of weather, states Mr. Stipe. Less camping equipment has to be carried and mobility is improved. A camping spot is available wherever a driver desires to stop.

We have not yet learned what Mr. Newlander's plans for the future are but hope that he may find it convenient to settle down here with us.

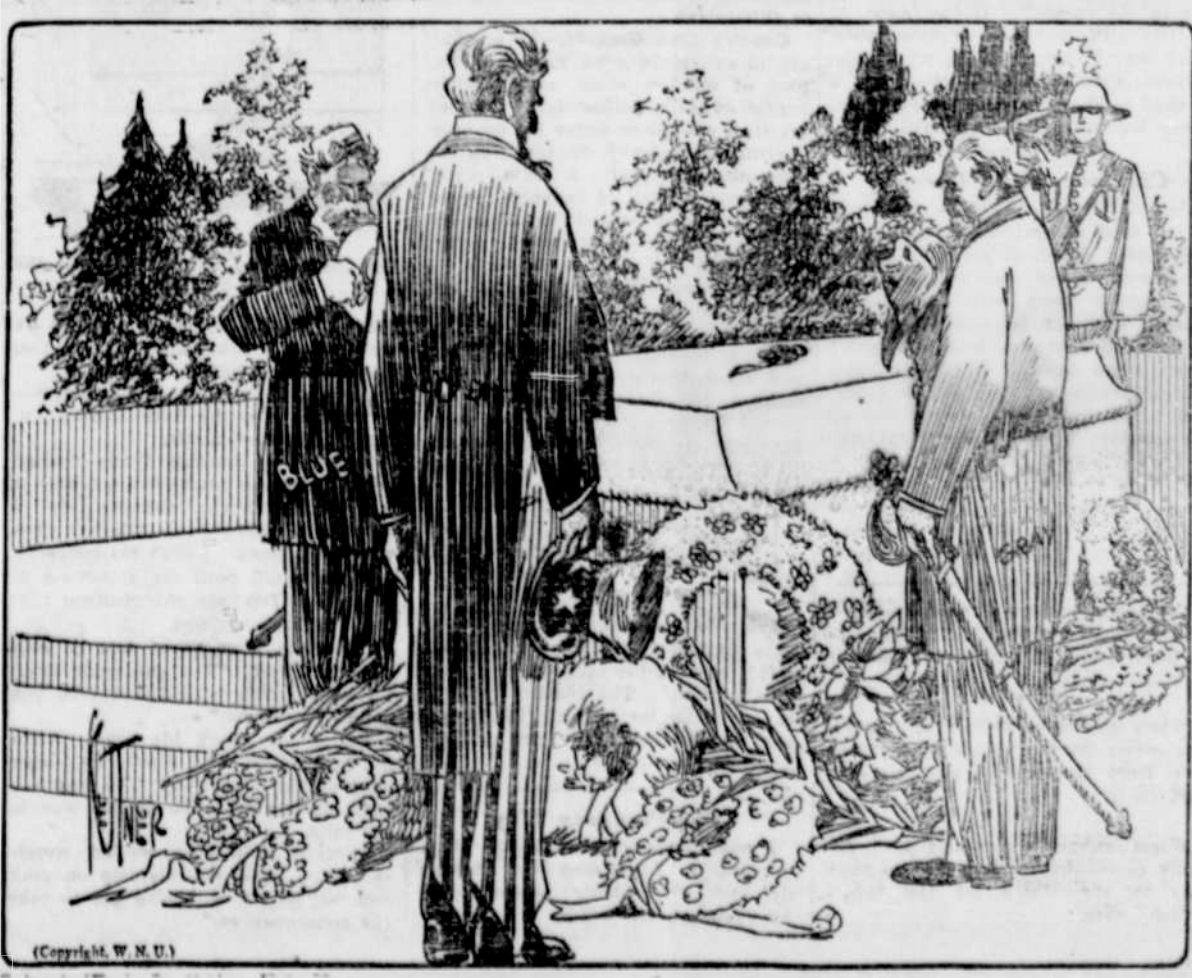
