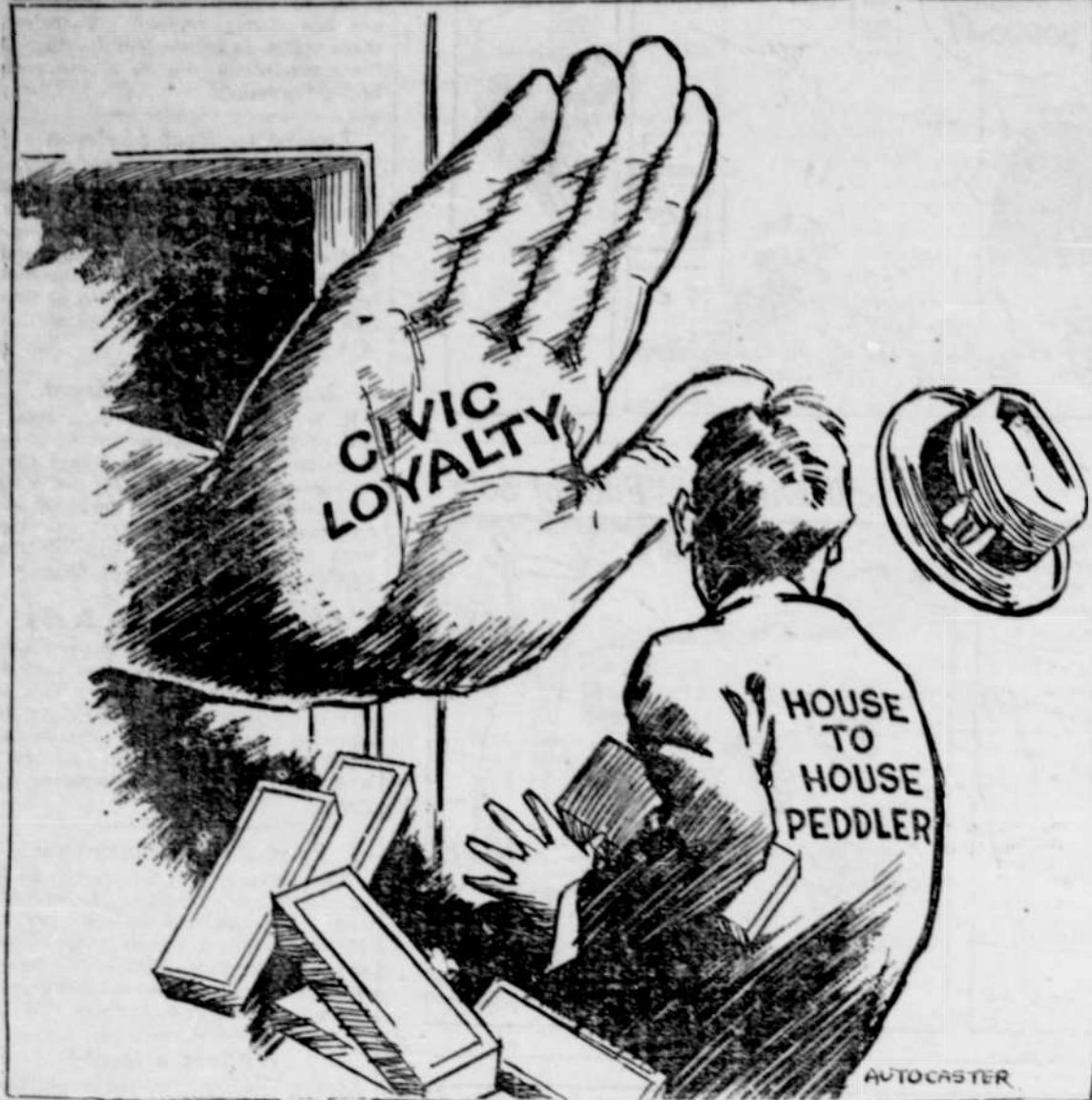
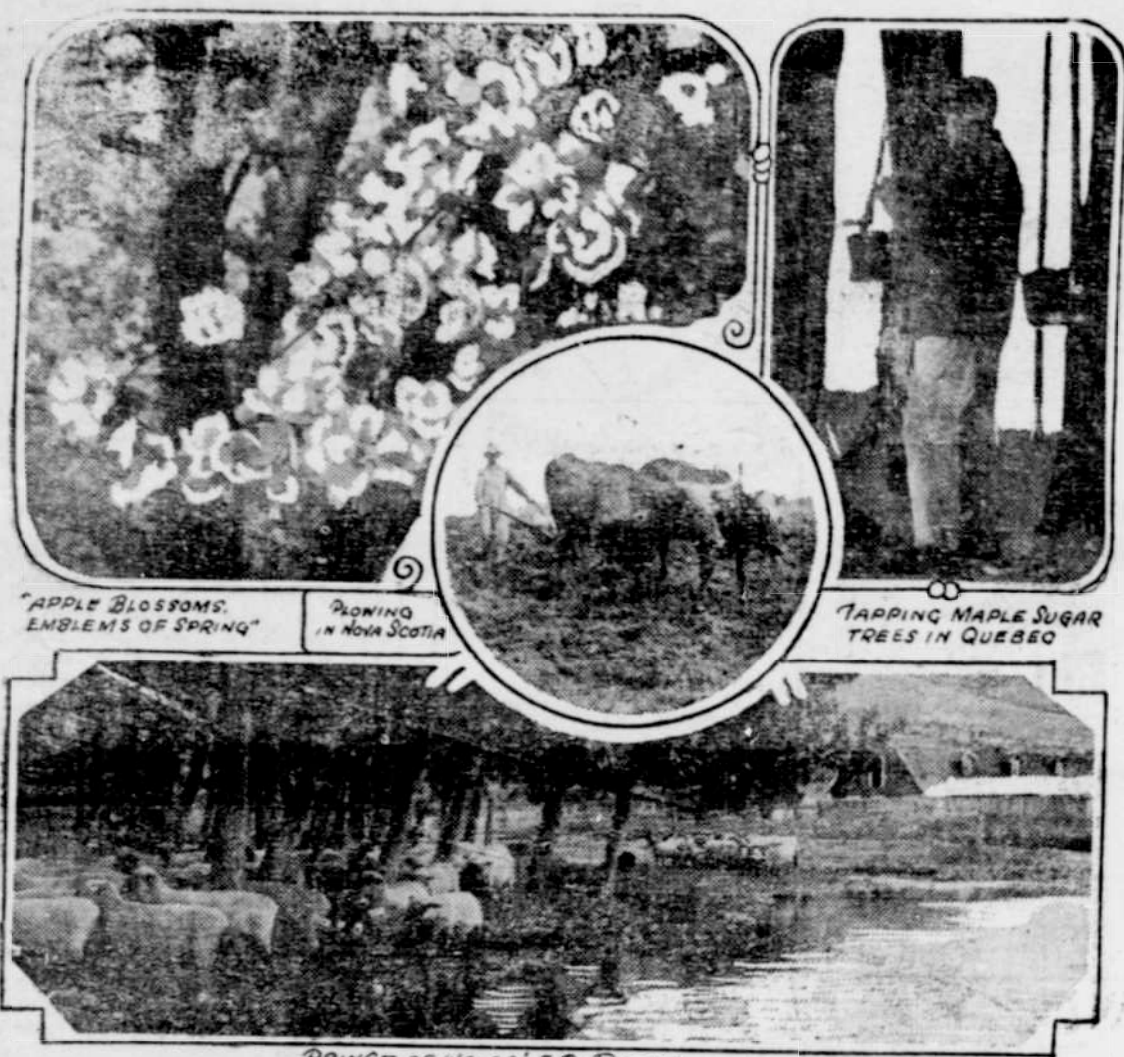


Becoming Obsolete
