U. of O. Psychologist

Wins Fellowship Place

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Ege-
ne.—Thomas Cutsforth, head of ex-
perimental psychology laboratories at
the University of Oregon, has been
awarded a research
fellowship with the
Social Science Re-
search council, an
organization regarded
as the foremost sci-
entific group in the
United States. Cuts-
forth, who has be-
come a national
authority on syn-
esthesia, and psy-
chology of the blind,
will work on the
project "psychopathic personality of
the blind as a factor in economic mal-
adjustment." Cutsforth himself is
blind, but he has never considered this
a handicap in any way, and has actu-
ally designed and helped to make much

WALTER DAMROSCH TO DIRECT NEW MUSIC EDUCATION HOUR

Arrangements have been completed
for a special series of 24 educational
orchestral concerts to be broadcast
next season, beginning in the fall. The
new Music Education Hour sponsored
by the Radio Corporation of America
will be under the direction of Walter
Damrosch, the dean of American musi-
cians, who made the Hour of the past
season one of the great accomplish-
ments of radio broadcasting.

In response to the nation-wide de-
mand for an educational hour of music
for young people and children, next
season's program will be given Friday
mornings at 11 o'clock Eastern stand-
ard time, so that it can be heard in
the schools. It is planned to use 23
stations of the National Broadcasting
company and associated stations, cov-
ering the entire country between the
Atlantic Coast and the Rocky Moun-
tains.

In making the announcement, David
