SCIENCE IN SEARCH FOR HEALTHY HEAT

Institute of Thermology to Study Home Heating and Ventilating.

Establishment of the Holland Institute of Thermology with the object of making American homes healthier has been announced by A. R. Landwehr, multi-millionaire president of the Holland Furnace Company, of Holland, Mich., who declared that the scientific resources of the Institute would be utilized to the fullest extent to teach the American home-owner in a practical way the science of heating and ventilating in relation to health.

"In founding the Institute of Thermology I hope to be able to give a worthwhile contribution to health conditions in our country," said Mr. Landwehr. "A prominent research engineer will be placed in charge of the tests and investigations to be made by the staff of experts of the Institute and the results will be placed before the public in the form of reports of their findings from time to time."

Among the subjects of far-reaching importance which the Institute will investigate and upon which it will enlighten the public so as to improve the health conditions of their homes will be:

1. How many diseases result from the improper or inadequate humidifying of homes.
2. How the seasonal occurrence of certain respiratory diseases can be modified or reduced by control of the humidity, temperature and circulation of the air in dwellings.
3. The national economic loss due to heat, and how it can be prevented.
4. The amount of heat, and consequently of money, which is lost in the average American home due to improper home construction, and how this can be corrected.

5. Fuel studies, indicating the most economical ways of using our national fuel-reserves.

How Much "Fresh" Air?
6. Medical analysis of all phases of conditioning the air so that the atmosphere in the home contributes to the health, efficiency and comfort of the family.

7. The number of air changes required in each room every hour to keep the atmosphere that is breathed healthy and free from noxious germs.

8. Methods by which air may be sterilized in order to minimize the circulation of disease-ridden air in homes.

9. Heating costs: methods by which the average home-owner may calculate heat-losses through the walls and windows of his home and may revise the construction accordingly.

Mr. Landwehr is noted for his public-spiritedness and has done many things to make his home town a big business center. He was born on a Missouri farm and moved on his father's farm as a boy. His entry into the commercial world was as a house to house canvasser.

Business Growth a Romance.
In 1902 he married Louise Kolla of Akron, Ohio, the daughter of J. P. Kolla, who in 1906 invented the Holland Furnace and who is now general superintendent of production. Mr. Landwehr took over the selling end of the business, using the only method he knew, namely, ringing the door bell of houses after house. During the first year the little company, with only three salesmen, did a business of \$38,000. Since then it has doubled its output about every two years until today the business has multiplied between four and five hundred fold. Mr. Landwehr has shared the profits of the business with his fellow citizens of Holland. He has helped many worthwhile new ideas of merit and is now president or a member of the board of directors of many corporations.

Unique Oregon Paper To Be on Exhibition

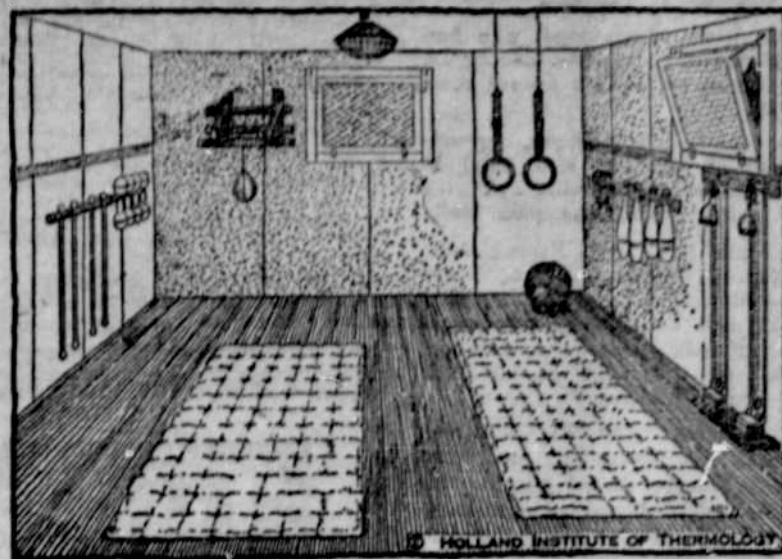
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—What is believed to be the smallest newspaper ever published in Oregon has recently been added to the journal collection of the University of Oregon library, announces M. H. Douglas, librarian. This is a publication edited by Sheldon Sackett, now editor of the McMinnville Telephone Register, when he was eight years old, and the paper was just 8 1/2 by 3 1/2 inches in size. The paper was called the Sheridan Sun, and later developed into a two column, 6 by 9 inch sheet. The paper consisted of four pages. In the issue now at the library, dated April 29, 1911, are such items as "Former President Roosevelt arrived at his Long Island home after a speaking tour to the Pacific Coast and back." Among local news the tiny paper found room for a couple of verses of poetry. It is well written and carefully edited, and will be regarded as one of the prize exhibits of the newspaper display, says Mr. Douglas.

Basement Gym Is Boon to Kiddies



TWO plus admission to see the great Olympian team in action and it would be cheap at twice the price! The scene is not Amsterdam, but the family basement rigged up as a gymnasium and an irresistible magnet to all the boys in the neighborhood.

This is but one of the many uses that extra space in the basement may be put to. Most new houses are designed with such rooms in mind but in many homes already built the basement plan can be rearranged to afford a study, workshop, gymnasium, billiard room or sewing room. Here, for example, is a model basement layout, made from an actual house plan and practical in every way.

The basement is seven and a half feet deep, which is of ample depth to admit the finest type of Holland warm air heating plant. The stairs come down in most houses at the center of the basement, which is not ideal from the point of the warm air furnace but still is feasible in most cases, as shown here.

Yet with all these provisions, there is still room for a gymnasium, 13 x 22. It is partitioned off with matched lumber or a wallboard nailed to 2 x 4 uprights. The masonry walls are whitewashed and the first floor joists sealed with a sound-deadening material in the interest of the nerves of the grown-ups above. Guards at the windows and over the lights are an essential, as are a couple of regular gym mats. The rest of the equipment can be acquired bit by bit, as gifts or from vacation-time earnings.

It will be noticed that the combined furnace-room, fuel-room and wood-box space are 11 x 22 feet in size—slightly more than one-third of the area of the basement. This is the fault of this particular house-plan, not of the Holland warm air super-circulating heating plant, which will operate adequately in a space as small as 10x10, if need be. One special feature of the Holland furnace, which the housewife may take into account in planning her laundry in the basement, is that a hot-water coil may be installed as an integral part of the heating plant. This is a practical means of maintaining a hot water supply, and a laundry in the basement would reduce the cost of a "hook-up" with the laundry tubs to a minimum. A warm air leader pipe may be provided which will fill the laundry with warm air and help to dry the clothes in the winter time or during rainy weather. The cleanliness of this furnace is another factor which contributes to the practicability of the basement-laundry, for the clothes may be washed and hung up to dry there without any danger from soot and dust because the interior construction of the heating plant prevents dirt and soot from escaping into the basement.
