The event was celebrated Nov. 12 at the home of their daughter, Mrs. J. A. Chilton, 1301 Brookside avenue, a few intimate friends joining the couple to extend congratulations.

Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy, who have resided here nearly twenty years, coming from Portland, Ore., are both well and happy. He is 82 and she is 85 years of age. On the anniversary of their marriage they talked reminiscences of their early years together. She was formerly Rebecca Knight Abbott and became the bride of Robert Kennedy in Stove, Frontier county, Neb., the marriage being solemnized in the Plum Creek court house in 1878.

Mr. and Mrs. Chilton the Kennedys have a daughter, Mrs. Irene Grandgeorge of Beaverton, Ore., and a son, W. W. Abbott, of Portland, both of whom visited their parents recently. There are also five grandchildren, six great grandchildren, and two adopted children, Mr. Geo. Meagher of Seattle and Mrs. Grace Hughton of Beaverton.

Oregon State News

A new city hall at Arlington is nearing completion. The Sherwood Theater is being remodeled and improved. Construction of Hessian Block at A new Kickey Prairie schoolhouse near Molalla was dedicated, recently. Harry Sprouts is erecting a modern cream warehouse at Condon. 17 Streets have been improved in the East Broadway project in Portland. A new high school gymnasium is formally dedicated at Gold Beach. The grounds around the Umpqua River lighthouse station to be improved. The Keno section of the Ashland Klamath highway will be paved in near future. Units 1 and 2 of the Klamath Falls trunk line sewer are under construction. Plans are under way for the construction of a new courthouse at Tillamook. The California-Oregon Power Co may purchase Oakland electric and water systems. The Pioneer Hardware Store building in Marshfield is being entirely remodeled. Lovejoy ramp has been completed to Fourteenth and Lovejoy Streets, Portland. A \$35,000 new bank building and apartment house are under construction at Arlington. The survey of the Yellowstone Cut-off route through Lake County was started recently. The Roosevelt Highway was recently traveled between Reedsport and Coos County line. A \$30,000 radio airway station will be established by U. S. Gov. graunaut near Medford. The U. S. Department of Commerce will establish an airplane radio station in Portland. 15 miles of Central Oregon Highway will soon be graded between Harper and Burrell ranch. A \$3,000 new pipe organ has been installed in the reconstructed Methodist Church in Gresham. Road development and maintenance cost Marion county \$54,145 during the month of October. An Astoria building company has been awarded a contract for the construction of two new boats for the Eoath Fisheries Co. The Condon, Kinzua and Southern Railroad has purchased a new gas coach for service on the line between Condon and Kinzua. The State Highway Commission will award contracts for the strengthening Lower Columbia River Highway between Rock Creek and Big Noise Creek.
