### VALLEY FRUIT GROWERS HAVE MEETING

The Tualatin Valley Fruit Growers held a special meeting Monday evening at the Beaverton Realty Office where a representative of Bodle Co. offered a cash price of 5 1/2¢ a lb. for next year's strawberry crop. There was considerable discussion pro and con in regards to possible future prices but no definite price was agreed upon.  
Some very interesting facts were brought out at the meeting that would be of value to anyone in the berry growing business. For instance, it was estimated by the Bodle representative that there is about one-half the acreage in strawberries now as there was two years ago. Oregon has about 11,000 acres, Washington 8,500, California 1600 and Missouri 27,000 in strawberries. It is believed that prices will be better because of the small acreage. It was further brought out that Oregon has the world beaten for Black Caps, both to quality and yield. It was also reported that nearly all of the Oregon fruit is labeled California and sent East under that label. Much of the fruit put up in Washington County bears the label of a California concern and the world is led to believe that they are eating California grown fruits.
