Committee Is Appointed To Prepare Petition For New Road

After the reading of the minutes by the secretary, the Chair gave the floor to Mr. Lynch, who made a short talk on the proposed bringing of an airplane manufacturing plant to be located on the former Fremann Addition.

Mr. Lynch was followed by Mr. Jones, who represents the Pricair Aircraft Co. of San Francisco and who stated that the company was looking for a location in some place where there was ample room for a landing field.

Mr. Dean, also of Portland, spoke after Mr. Jones had finished and requested the Chair to call the names of the people present and ask them how much stock they would take in the proposed company if they should come out here.

Mr. E. Stipe moved that a committee be named to confer with the Portland men along the line of getting an airport here and Messrs. Dietsch, Raynard and Wilson were named on the committee.

County Commissioner Livermore was present at the meeting and when told that the community south of town had prepared a petition looking to the establishment of a Market road from Beaverton to Tigard, he said that the County Court had no official knowledge of the existence of such a petition.

Messrs. Dietsch, Sprague and Raynard were appointed a committee to prepare a petition to the County Court requesting that there be a survey made for a market road south from here going to Tigard.

City Water Supply Troubles Councilmen

Council Votes To Allow Mr. Fordney and Mr. Hughson \$100 Each

ONLY ONE RETIRES

Routine Business Is Discussed At Regular Meeting Monday Night

Again the water question bobbed up at the regular meeting of the Council, J. Cunningham of the Portland engineering firm of Baar & Cunningham was present and gave a confirmation of the estimate submitted by his Man last summer—that it would cost about \$4,000 to build the pipe line from the City limits of Portland to the Beaverton Reservoir.

The cost of building a line from the reservoir, he said had not yet been estimated but that he could submit a complete estimate when the Council meets on the twenty first of the month at which time the Council meets in adjourned session.

The regular routine of business of last year's Council was gone thru with, among which there was a letter from C. E. Hedge requesting payment for removing an obstruction from the sidewalk in front of his premises placed there by the brownies out on Halloween night.

The only one to retire from the City government was Mr. Raynard who was succeeded by Jas. Lewis. The City engineer was not formally appointed but it seemed understood that Baar and Cunningham would act, at least so far as the water question was concerned.

At the suggestion of a letter received, the Council voted to allow Mr. Fordney and Mr. Hughson a hundred dollars each for five feet on either side of Short St., the hundred dollars to be used in rocking the street.

A copy of a letter from the State Health Department to the Southern Pacific Railway was read which requested the Company to fill and cover the ditch alongside their tracks along Front street. Mayor Erickson suggested that the City get in touch with the Company and see if space for parking alongside the tracks could be rented from the Company when they had filled in the ditch.

After being sworn in Mayor Erickson made a very clever speech to those present. The principal recommendation which he carried was that the water question be taken up at an early date and settled. He went into the matter of sewers and wider streets but thought that the water question was of paramount importance.

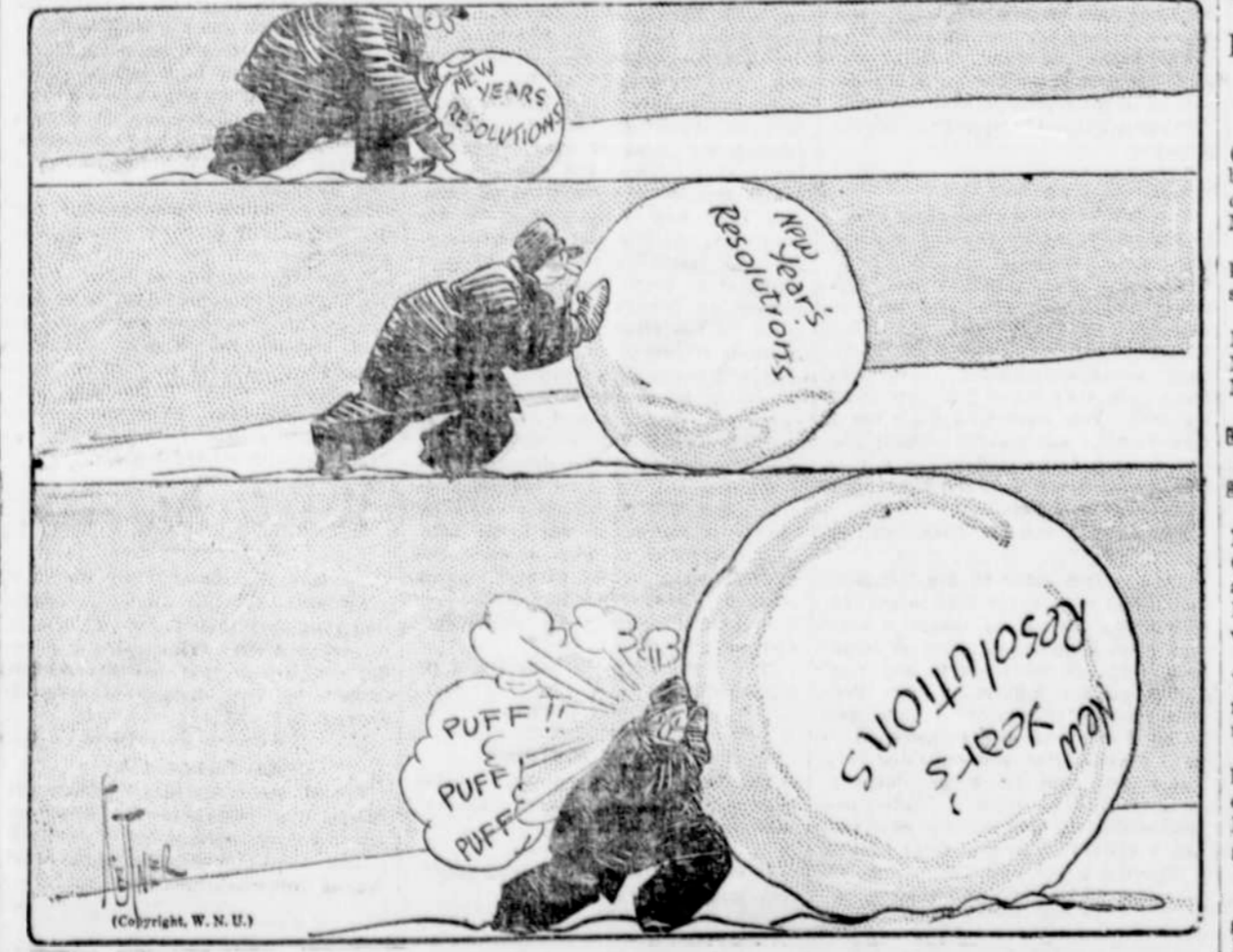
B. H. S. MEETS TIGARD HERE THIS FRIDAY
