## **HOME POINTERS**

The proportions for a very soft  
custard is three to four eggs to  
one quart of milk; for a firmer  
custard, four to six eggs to one  
quart of milk. Two eggs to one  
cup of milk will make a custard  
that will unmold, while three eggs  
to one cup of milk makes a very  
firm custard. When using yolks  
alone three to four yolks to one  
cup of milk makes a firm custard.  
One tablespoon cornstarch may be  
used under the same conditions that keep  
potatoes satisfactorily. They are  
thoroughly dried before storing.  
This is done by spreading them out  
in a dry, airy place after digging.  
The danger of losing canna is less-  
ened if they are stored in boxes  
of dry sand.

The standard proportion for a  
souffle is one cup of thick white  
sauce, three eggs, yolks and whites  
separated, and three-fourths of a  
cup of finely chopped meat, fish,  
—cheese or vegetables.

When cooking navy beans in hard  
water it is best to add one fourth  
to one-third teaspoon soda to each  
quart of beans.

Tough cuts of meat are best  
cooked in moist heat for a long  
time to soften the connective tis-  
sue, but tender cuts may be cook-  
ed quickly with dry heat.

The most common methods of  
cooking tough cuts are braising,  
pot roasting, stewing and fricasse-  
ing. Methods of cooking tender  
cuts are broiling, roasting and fry-  
ing.

Cake may be kept fresh when  
only a small amount is eaten at  
a time by cutting the desired num-  
ber of slices from the center of  
the cake. Push the two remaining  
pieces close together like a whole  
cake, and this will keep it moist  
and soft for several days.

One may avoid scraping carrots  
by scrubbing them and then boil-  
ing. When tender, rinse in cold  
water and the skins will rub off as  
easily as the skins of beets.

### **FARM REMINDERS**

Three year results with experi-  
ments on flax fertilizers at the  
Oregon Experiment station indicate  
that the maximum yield of fiber is  
obtained with the application of po-  
tassium fertilizers in conjunction  
with nitrate. This also seems to  
give the maximum height or length  
of stalk, reports W. L. Powers,  
chief of soils. Early planting, fol-  
lowed by supplemental irrigation to  
increase the growing period, is al-  
so found beneficial.

If stock steers are so fed as to  
make large gains in the winter  
time, they will make smaller gains  
the following summer on grass.  
For every extra pound that a  
steer gains through the winter he  
will make at least one-half pound  
less gain the following summer on  
grass, finds the experiment station.
