DEBT OWED GOVERNMENT Business owes a debt to government in the United States today.

Once it was not uncommon for boys of exceptional promise to turn as a matter of course to a political career. But today promising youngsters are more likely to seek the fame and fortune that come with success in business than to heed the call of public office.

A number of reasons may be advanced to explain the trend of brains to business. The larger financial reward is undoubtedly one of the chief reasons, and another is the lower esteem in which public officials are held, with the "good old days" in this case as the basis of comparison.

Recently it appears that business has been repaying, in some measure, its debt to government. Some men prominent in the business world have sought public office. Some of them have been turned down by the voters. Others have been elected.

But these men have sought public office after they had achieved success in business. It would be more to the point if some way were found of turning men of ability toward offices of public trust earlier in their careers.

RECORD PLOWED FURROW Last fall an Arkansas farmer plowed an unbroken furrow a mile long and "straight as a ruled line on a piece"—so he reported it to his local newspaper and thereby started something.

An Oklahoman soon announced that he had plowed a furrow a mile longer than the Arkansas's, but his record didn't stand very long. A Kansas farm hand came to the front with a furrow that beat the Oklahoma farmer's boy by more than half a mile. Then another Kansan produced witnesses to support his assertion that he had plowed an unbroken furrow of five miles which he declared was "the longest on record in the United States."

But someone in Washington looked into the records. It was discovered that George De Cow, a Government land locating agent at Meade, Kansas, in the summer of 1889 had plowed an unbroken furrow

sixty miles long. It was necessary to establish a public road between Meade and Ulysses. Between the two towns stretched level prairie land. Mr. De Cow hitched a plow behind a wagon and "with the aid of a compass a bee line was made to Ulysses and an unbroken furrow plowed all the way, a distance of sixty miles." Mr. De Cow's sixty-mile furrow will probably be an all-time record.

Uniform Traffic Codes Needed Washington has estimated that in one year there were 26,618 persons killed in highway accidents.

798,700 persons seriously injured and economic losses of \$672,097,000. This economic loss figure is exclusive of minor damage to motor vehicles.

The total killed is an increase of 1,316 over 1926.

The injuries and losses awaken one to the need of expansion of the nation's road building program, and the necessity for immediate adoption of uniform traffic codes.

Of course it will be said, the human factor is the main element contributing to these accidents.

But the human factor could be offset to a large extent by adequate motoring facilities and regulations.

Added to that, the individual practice of courtesy and caution is important.

Of late the great menace has been the "hit and run" driver. There is no more obnoxious person than the one who will run on and escape detection after hitting a pedestrian.

GIRL HOOPSTERS OUT Because of the recent small-pox epidemic, girls' basketball practice, which was scheduled to start November 5, did not get under way until November 7. Twenty candidates answered the first call.

Mrs. Cook will coach the girls' team again this year, and under her leadership a successful season is expected. Four letter-girls from last year's squad are back this year—two guards, one center, and one side-center.

GAME WITH NEW-BERG IS CANCELED The scheduled game between Newberg and Beaverton was canceled at the request of Newberg after the latter played Tigard. Newberg defeated Tigard, 8 to 0, while Beaverton won from the same team by a score of 33 to 7. Coach Cox expressed disappointment at the loss of a chance to pit his squad against that of the larger school, where he coached for several years.
