Beaverton Students Rate High At O.S.C.

35.4 Is Average Of Errors
In English Examination
Given This Fall

B. H. S. Graduates Rate High In
English Examination

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 15. (Special) Beaverton high school with five students sent to institutions of higher learning as freshmen last fall, tops the list of 107 Oregon high schools this year in records made by entering students in the fifth annual uniform placement examination in English given by institutions under the auspices of the committee on higher English of the Inland Empire Educational association.

The combined results of the examination have just been issued by Dr. M. Ellwood Smith, president of the Inland Empire Council of English Teachers and dean of basic arts and sciences here. His compilations show that 2369 students took the test, which was composed of 135 questions or elements, many of which were subject to more than one error in marking.

Errors this year numbered 83,789, or an average of 35.4 errors for each student. The least error average, made by the Beaverton students, was 19.4, while the largest average of 60.6 also was made by a school sending five freshmen.

Two Portland schools ranked in the first 12 on the list this year, these being St. Helens school and Washington high school. Five of the schools in the first 12 last year were in that group again this year. These are Milton-Freewater, Lakeview, Springfield, Pendleton and Washington (Portland).

"The results of the examination last fall were not dissimilar to those of the past," said Dean Smith. "The examination concerned itself with the barest essentials of English composition and took no account of the finer aspects of English, hence it does not attempt to measure the effectiveness of the English work in general of the various high schools."

Copies of the examination last used have been sent to the high schools of the state with the suggestion that it be tried on senior and freshmen students. The educational association promoted these uniform tests with the idea that the results would be useful to the high schools in anticipating better the needs of their graduates on entering college.

Institutions participating last fall are University of Oregon, Oregon State college, Monmouth Normal, Linfield, Pacific university, Eugene Bible university, Albany college, Pacific college, Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon Normal and Willamette.

LOCAL MAN'S COW WINS GOLD MEDAL

Gem's Beauty Belle, a fine purebred Jersey cow, owned by J. J. Van Kleeck and Sons, Beaverton, Ore., won an American Jersey Cattle Club Gold Medal with her excellent record made in a recently completed official production test. She was started on the test when she was 5 years and 1 month of age, yielding 653.55 lbs. of butterfat and 11,905 lbs. of milk in 305 days. During the time of this test she was with calf for 212 days.

In her highest producing month Gem's Beauty reached a total of 85.53 lbs. of butterfat, and in another month her yield was 80.74 lbs. of butterfat. For four successive months her production remained above 72 lbs. of butterfat per month.

Mr. Van Kleeck has a splendid herd of purebred Jerseys and has done a great deal of production testing. Recently, La Croix's Amy, a fine old Jersey cow in his herd became the second highest butterfat producer in the Jersey breed making an official production record after reaching 18 years of age. This cow, now in her twentieth year, yielded a total of 550.90 lbs. of butterfat and 9,613 lbs. of milk in 305 days on two milkings per day.

Thinks Bull Run Intended
For City Folks. Rain
Water Best For Us

GIVES KINDS, WATER

Local Man Gives Plenty Of Advice
On Present Water Situation

Editor, Beaverton Review, Beaverton, Oregon, Dear Sir:
"How dear to my heart are the scenes of my childhood."

Not being used much to composing, I don't exactly know which kind of a verse to start with, but I read a story once that started with a verse. I've heard that the hardest part of composing is in getting started. Now I want to talk about water, and every body knows the verse at the top is about water and maybe it will do pretty good. I thought some of the one about "Water, water everywhere and not a drop to drink," but I kind of think the guy who wrote that came from Beaverton and maybe he would get mad if I used it so I guess I better stick to the first one.

Now I suppose the Hon. City Council is looking for enlightenment on this aquatic question and my desire to assist them all I can has prompted me to indite this enlightening missive.

Being a long time resident of these parts, I have had all kinds of stuff to drink and think I am qualified to expound some valuable information on the subject. First, I think the Hon. Council should familiarize themselves with the various kinds of water and which kind is best adapted to our particular requirements. This subject necessarily requires a somewhat academic treatment in order to make it comprehensive. The Hon. Council should make a deep study of the question in order to decide which is the best stuff for us to drink. For the benefit of the Hon. Council, I will name a few of the more familiar kinds.
