

Quebec Dogsled Derby a Test of Speed and Stamina



The interest and enthusiasm evidenced by many thousands of excited spectators who witnessed the 1927 Eastern International Dogsled Derby, held the third week in February at Quebec, indicates that dogsled racing has come to stay. Champions "mushers" from all parts of the United States and Canada foregather annually at the Ancient Capital to participate in this classic of the snows, which is one of the best means of ascertaining the type of animal most suited for running mail and supplies to isolated lumber camps and trading posts. The race is usually run over a 120-mile course in three successive days, irrespective of

weather conditions. It is really a race against time, over the same 40-mile course, the team covering the 120 miles in the shortest time being declared the winner. The race was organized in 1921, under the auspices of the Eastern International Dogsled Derby Clubs. Its objects being to stimulate interest in dog racing and improve the quality of sled dogs. Emile St. Godard, of the Pas, Manitoba, by cutting down the time established in 1926 by Frank Dupuis of Quebec by 54 minutes and 35 seconds during the 1927 Derby, has earned the position of champion dog-racing driver of North America. While St. Godard was engaged in beating Dupuis' record by nearly an hour in his determination to win

over his doughty opponent, Leonard Seppala, the Alaskan dog racing wizard was striving to overtake the Manitoba musher. Past records were roughly treated when Seppala covered the 120 miles of the race in 11 hours, 57 minutes and 45 seconds—34 minutes and 37 seconds faster than Dupuis' 1926 time. St. Godard takes as much care of his dogs as a fond parent, and it is his contention that the animals will respond to the urging of their driver just in proportion to the amount of care and attention they receive at his hands. The Chateau Frontenac, Quebec's medieval hostelry, is already receiving reservations for the coming Dog Derby which will be held on Feb. 21, 22 and 23, inclusive, 1929, and which will terminate with the "Dogsled Derby Ball," a society function attracting increasing numbers of smart folk annually.

A new barber shop has been installed at Drain.
The new Laurelhurst Christian Church was recently dedicated.
The Roseburg Highway is being graveled south of Myrtle Point.
The installation of electric light in Kinton is under consideration.
The work on the new court house at Roseburg is progressing rapidly.
A boat building industry may be started soon near Winchester Bay mill.
Construction of a new water system is progressing rapidly in Hood River.
A new Medical Arts building will be erected in Roseburg in the near future.
Building permits issued in McMinnville during 1928 totaled over \$162,284.
Plans are progressing for the establishment of a new airport at Medford.
Jantzen knitting mill will erect a \$501,000 spinning mill in Portland immediately.
The State Highway Commission has recently awarded contracts totaling \$115,000.
A \$20,000 bond issue is being urged for the construction of the Condon city hall.
The old Portland road within the city limits of St. Helens is being extensively repaired.
The Newberg Abstract Company, capitalized at \$1,000, has been granted a charter.
Dike work has been completed along the Roosevelt Highway in the vicinity of Reedsport.
Approximately \$1,000,000 has been expended in Klamath Falls during 1928 for building construction.
Plans are completed for the expenditure of approximately \$25,000 to remodel a business building in Portland at Fourth and Morrison streets.
The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. are planning to place an overhead cable over the Tillamook River about two miles west of Tillamook.

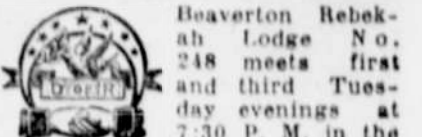
OLAF HILL

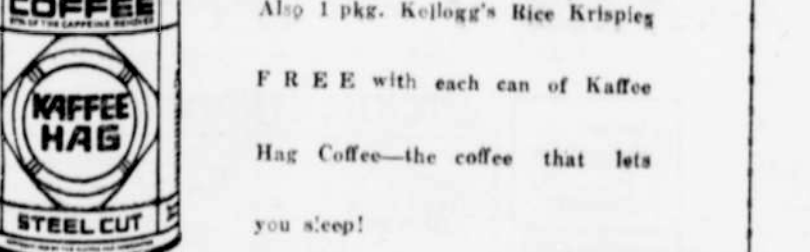

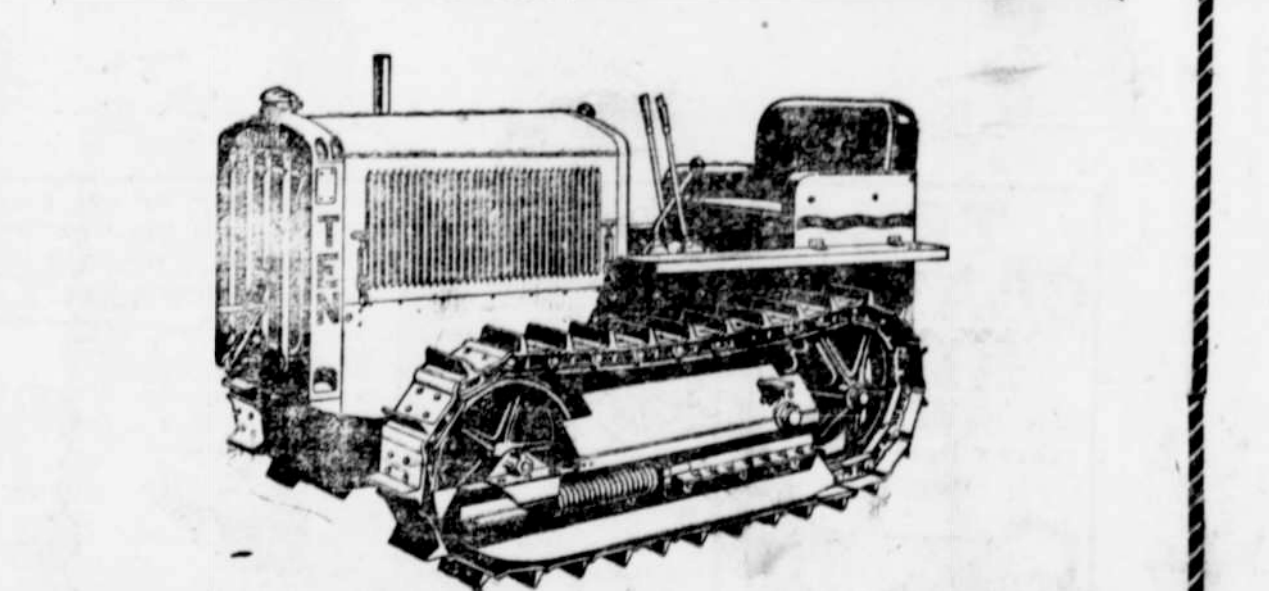
