Dairy Commission Is Sponsoring Measure

Bill, H. Passed, Will Establish, Uniform Regulations on Milk Sale

TO PROTECT HEALTH

Food and Dairy Commissioner Will Enforce Bill. It Is Passed

When the Oregon State Reporting Service, it is necessary to impose upon all dairymen of the state some regulations to protect the health of the people. The Food and Dairy Commissioner, J. D. Smith, today announced that the bill to establish uniform regulations on the sale and distribution of milk and cream is now being introduced into the House of Representatives. The bill, which will come before the legislature on Monday, is intended to establish uniform regulations on the sale and distribution of milk and cream, and to provide for the enforcement of these regulations by the Food and Dairy Commissioner.

The bill was prepared by J. D. Smith, food and dairy commissioner, who believes that some form of uniform regulation is necessary to the health of the state.

The proposed bill summarizes the quality of milk and cream by specifying the minimum fat content and the maximum of impurities allowed. It also provides for the enforcement of these regulations by the Food and Dairy Commissioner.

An equipment necessary to the production and marketing of milk and cream must meet with certain standards. Objection was raised at this point in the preliminary hearing. There was some question as to whether the cost of following regulations would not be prohibitive to the small producer.

Representative B. F. Swigg replied to this objection that regulation was not for rich or poor, but to protect health.

The bill provides that the Food and Dairy Commissioner should enforce the act if passed.

WIDOW'S PENSIONS MAY BE INCREASED

A bill permitting juvenile and county courts to increase allowances to dependent mothers, was introduced into the House of Representatives January 16, by Wilbur Henderson, of Portland.

The increase is optional not mandatory. Mothers whose husbands are dead or inmates of some Oregon state or county institution, and do not have property of a value disproportionate to the actual needs of the family are eligible for the allowance.

The bill proposes to increase the allowance maximum for one child from \$15.00 to \$20.00 a month, and for each additional child from \$10.00 to \$15.00 a month. The total amount to be discretionary with the court, but in no case shall exceed \$75.00 a month, formerly \$50. The mother must have resided in the state at least three years, and in the state at least three years, and in the county one year, immediately preceding the application for assistance. The children must be under the age of 16 years.
