NUMBER OF DIPLOMAS ARE GRANTED

Diplomas of achievement, as issued by the National Dairy Association have been forwarded by N. G. Jamison, dairy extension specialist to County Agent O. T. McWhorter for the following: H. Lehenow, Cornelius, R. 2, who was awarded diploma in recognition of having developed 11 cows to a yearly average of 314.1 lbs. of butter fat in 1928, and a second diploma dated October 15, 1927, for having developed a herd of 13 cows to an average yearly production of 326 lbs. of butter fat; E. J. Brooks, Cornelius, R. 2, for having developed 8 cows to a yearly average production of 350.1 lbs. of butter fat in 1927; H. Behrman, Cornelius, R. 2, for having developed 14 cows to an average production of 374.7 lbs. of butter fat in 1927; T. H. Peeden-thal, Hillsboro, R. 5, 17 cows to an annual average production of 308 lbs. of butter fat in 1927, and John K. Ibrig, Forest Grove, 7 cows to an annual average of 322.5 lbs. of butter fat in 1927.

These records were made through tests conducted by the Columbia Cow Testing Association which extends its activities into Washington County thru the O. A. C. Extension Service.

Visible Records As Time Savers

Mark New Era In Modern Business



NEW YORK—Installation buying has made system in keeping office records the first commandment of business success.

The increased burden put on credit departments and the necessity for having constant knowledge of stocks and materials in the more rapid movement of goods which installment buying produces, puts many business houses to a severe test, according to W. F. Merrill, president of the Remington Rand Business Service Inc.

"Necessity is revolutionizing office routine and is literally forcing manufacturers and merchants to install the latest approved equipment," said Mr. Merrill, in an address here.

"Elimination of waste effort and the saving of seconds in the office is the real secret of business success in the new era of credit purchasing."

"The blind card file was considered an efficient way of keeping records in the days when business was more deliberate, but the large business house that retained that method today would soon find itself weeks and even months behind in filling orders. Visible records enable clerks to do in six seconds what it would take them fifty-five seconds to accomplish with the old-time blind file. The costliest error many smaller business houses make is in retaining antiquated methods of keeping records."

"Elimination of from four to eight waste motions on the part of clerks in keeping records may mean the difference between business success and failure for the modern manufacturer or merchant, at a time when credit buying has given business a generally a tremendous impetus."

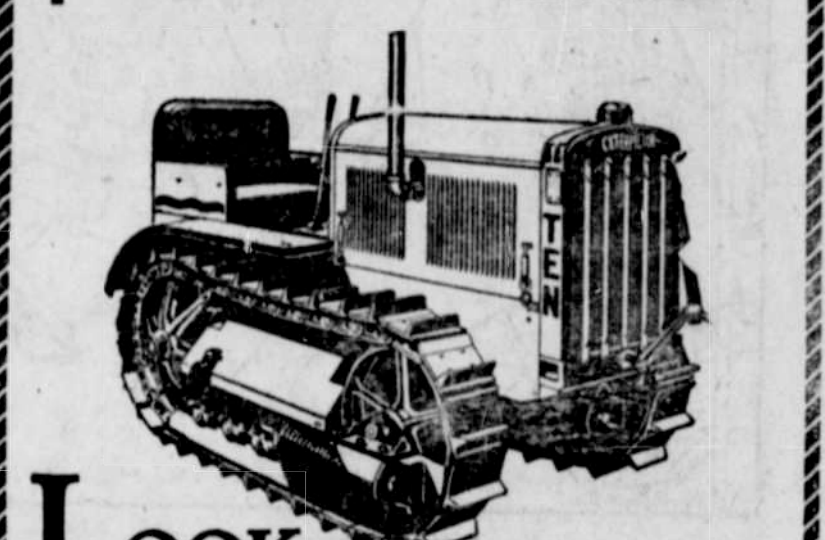

Three Hundred Years of Progress in Fighting the Menace That Is Fire



Since the first candle snuffer made its appearance about 300 years ago humans have given much thought to the perfection of methods, and devices for staying the devastating powers of fire, and during from the crude snuffer the world has known used myriads of instruments for this purpose.

Bucket brigades, hand pumps, and chemicals have been used in turn. We have known the man drawn engine and hose company, then the horse-drawn, and now the motor driven vehicles which serve this purpose, and now science is seeking other methods than these; is delving deeply into the same destroying properties of chemicals, and gases, with the view of eventually devising a system of fire fighting which will eliminate much of the costly and ponderous paraphernalia now in use.
