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Bond Election Voted Down at Meeting

The Vote Was Almost Unanimous Against Holding Bond Election

NUMBER GIVE VIEWS

Mayor Erickson Presides At Meeting. Many Talks Are Given

A large and enthusiastic crowd met in the high school auditorium, Tuesday evening, in response to a call from the city council. The purpose of the meeting was to find out if the people of Beaverton were in favor of holding a bond election for the purpose of obtaining Bull Run water.

The meeting was called to order at 8 p. m. by Mayor Erickson, who presided over the meeting.

A statement of the present indebtedness of the town and the engineer's estimate of what Bull Run would cost was placed upon the blackboard by the city recorder, Mr. Thynge.

Some very interesting talks on the water question were given by a good number of our able citizens. Mr. Walter Harris gave some facts and figures that he had obtained from the City of Oswego in regard to the cost of their water supply. He found they were not paying nearly as much for their supply of Bull Run water as our city did when we were using it.

Mr. J. Raymond, Mr. Hedge, Mr. Wilson and Dr. Mason gave as their opinion that we should not tax the city any more than we could help, until we had taken care of the present indebtedness.

Alderman M. W. Manning stated the view of the council as to the facts of the water situation.

Mr. E. Stipe told that if we continued to buy water from him he was ready and willing to do all in his power to supply the town with water.

Mr. Erickson gave a pleasant talk, in which he stated he was not in favor of bonding for Bull Run water, and was not in favor of it at the time it was put in.

A vote was taken at the close of the meeting for the bond election. The vote was almost unanimous against it.

REP. WILKES OPPOS- ING S. BILL NO. 69

Salem, Feb. 27. "I can not support this bill," Representative L. E. Wilkes, Hillsboro, said in opposing S. B. 69, which was passed by both houses. The bill proposes a refunding of the tax on gasoline to rural free delivery-carriers.

"If we let down on one class we will have to let down on another," Mr. Wilkes declared. "We are paying another part of the government's expenses. From the taxpayer's standpoint it sets a bad precedent."

Those who supported the bill contended that rural mail carriers are very poorly paid at present and that they can not operate at four cents per mile in winter when the roads are in bad condition. It was also pointed out that other western states have similar laws.

Representative Joseph N. Scott, Pendleton, said: "It seems to me the United States government should give adequate compensation to mail carriers. They are in better financial condition than Oregon."

BILL IS INTRODUCED TO REGULATE DANCE HALLS

Salem, Feb. 27. Only towns with a population of 500 or less will now come under S. E. 78, as it was amended by the house committee on health and public morals.

The bill is primarily intended to regulate public dance halls and so-called "social clubs" which are located in the country or in small towns. In its original form it applied to all dance halls outside the limits of towns of 2500 population but this was considered too high a figure.

Representative S. L. Stewart, of Polk County, pointed out that many towns much smaller had very strict regulations along such lines and the bill would interfere too much with the self-government of these towns.

The words which provided that the population must be according to figures shown by the last preceding census taken by the United States were re-inserted upon the suggestion of Representative Wm. Briggs, of Ashland who said:

"If that provision is cut out those who are close to the 500 mark can import a few people and claim that they do not come under the law."

Senator George Dunn, Ashland, who introduced the bill said: "The main purpose of the bill is to regulate these so-called social clubs where they go and dance all night. They call them clubs so they will not come under the regulations for public dance halls. It is only in the country and very small towns where such things take place."

Directors Are Named For Local Airport

Captain A. I. Eagle, Commandant Pearson Field Joins Corporation

RUN BY DIRECTORATE

Breese Aircraft Company Is Moving Here From San Francisco

Captain A. I. Eagle, commandant of Pearson's Flying field, Vancouver, and Vance Breese, designer of the trans-Pacific monoplane Aloha, are included in the list of men announced as directors of the Breese Aircraft corporation.

The company recently purchased the Watts Airport at Beaverton for \$70,000 and is transferring its manufacturing operations to Oregon from California.

Other directors are: B. E. Palmer, manager of the Northern Pacific Terminal company, S. P. Pardee, assistant manager of the West Coast Hydro-Electric company; C. G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue; Burt Chappell, vice-president of the Brotherhood National bank; Judge Ekwall of the Multnomah county circuit court, Bradley Ewers, attorney; Henry Hayek, the president of Henry Hake & Co., and Nelson E. Jones of San Francisco.

Breese, who is president of the company, will act as chief pilot, and Jones will continue as vice-president and general manager. The company's operations will be fully controlled by the directorate under a voting trust which will give the board the voting right for the majority of stockholders for a two-year period.

Reports from San Francisco state that practically all the company's machinery has been crated and that it along with uncompleted airplanes will be shipped to the Beaverton plant next week.

The company plans to start operations soon after March first on a 50-plane schedule. It will produce only cabin monoplanes of the Aloha type, which are used for airmail express and commercial operations.
