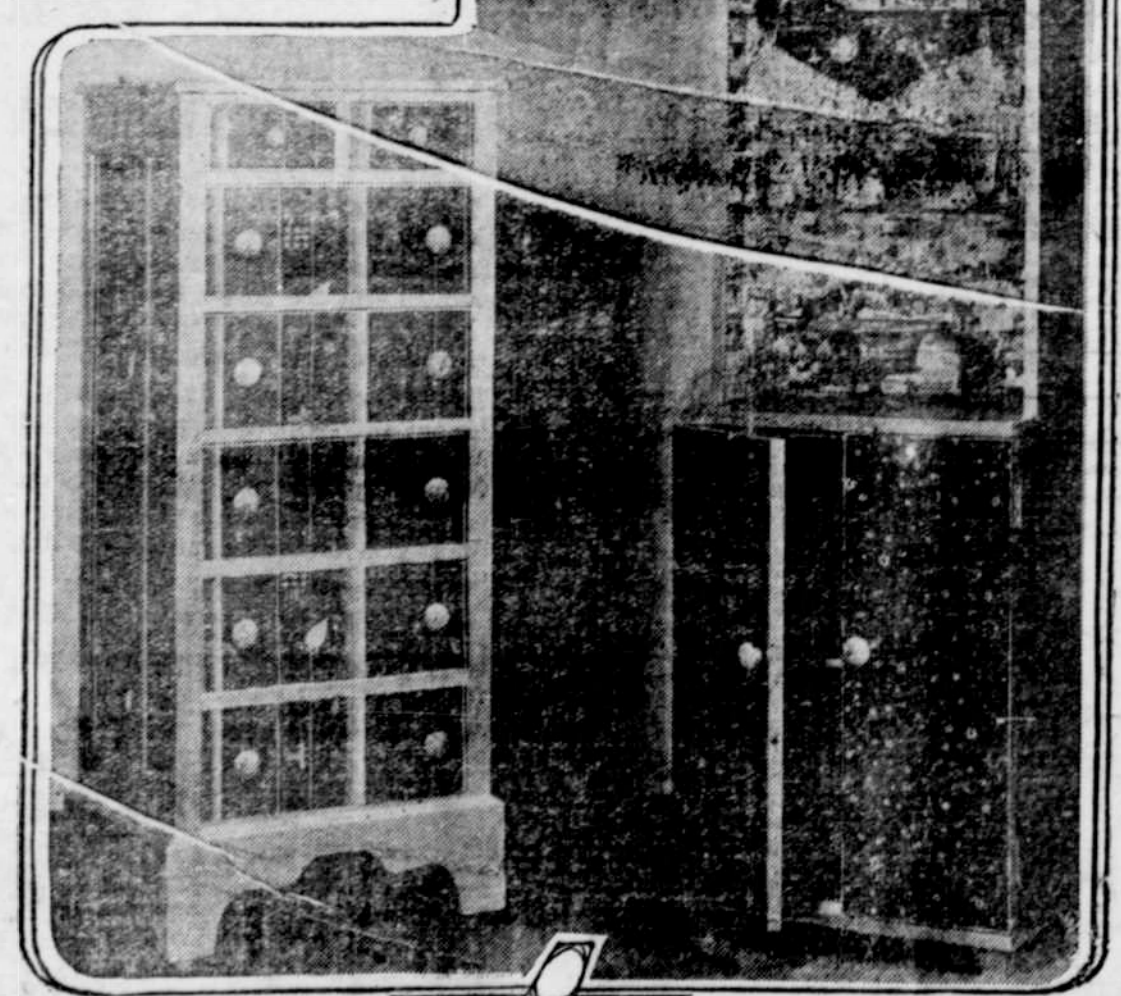

Craft Society Tells How to Make Pretty Things at Home

This modern furniture, which is so much the rage in all the big European and American cities, and which is extremely expensive to buy, can be made in your own home if you follow directions recently given out by the Craft Society.

To make the chest of drawers, resembling a skyscraper, you need two sheets of silver paper, an 8-yard roll of plaid wallpaper, the best liquid glue on the market, and 8 yards of black fluted paper. If you have an old chest of drawers, you need only to decorate it, but if you haven't, the



size of the one shown is: top, 18x22 inches; height, 33 inches. First, clean, smooth and shellac entire job, remove handles from the drawers, and cut strips of silver paper on all front edges and top inside edges, allowing an extra half inch on both sides. Glue in place. Cut panels of plaid paper for inside sides and bottoms of drawers, in each case 1/4 inch less than actual size of surface. Lapse in place. Cut panels of black fluted paper for outside drawer fronts, and glue in place, taking care that the drawer fronts, when completely decorated (note illustration) present

a regular pattern. Lapse aluminum foil on knobs, or cover them with silver paint. Chest frame: Cut silver strips for all outside surfaces and beveled edges except the two side panels; cut panels of black fluted paper for side panels and top of chest and glue in place, allow to dry, and then shellac all decorated surfaces of drawers and frame. The directions for decorating the modernistic cupboard are similar to those for making the chest of drawers. The materials are: Two maps of any city, or any other decorative design that you like; one sheet of silver

paper, two sheets of red and gold-flecked paper; aluminum foil or silver paint for handles. All edges are decorated with silver paper. The maps are glued on the inside of the open part of the cupboard. The top of the closed part is covered with silver paper, and the doors and other panels are decorated with the red and gold-flecked paper. Lastly, be sure that you use the best quality of liquid glue obtainable, for if you affix your decorative paper with paste, or cheap glue, it is apt to peel off when subjected to the heat of the sun.
