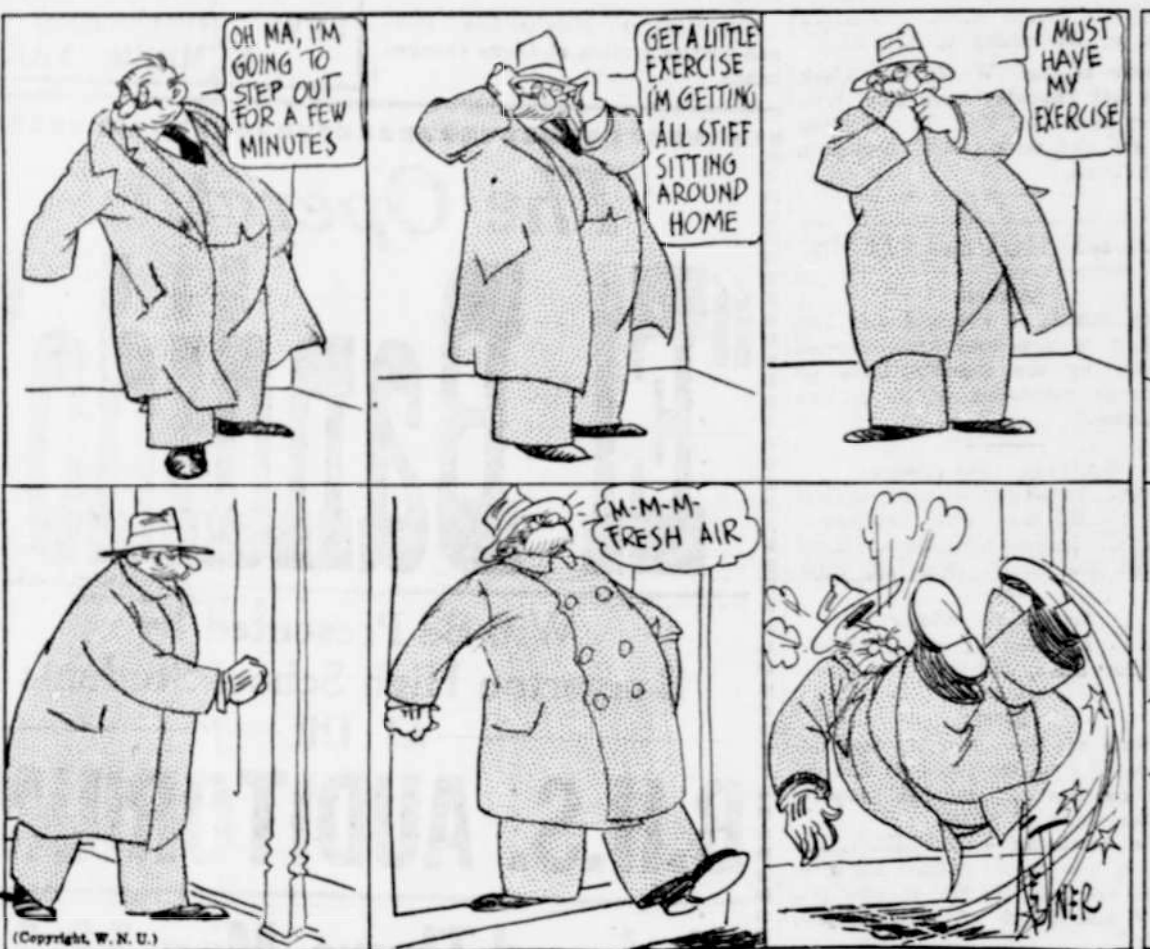

Well defined wave-cut cliffs and terraces show two distinct shore lines of this early lake, one the "Bonneville shore line," about 1,000 feet above the present lake, and the other the "Provo shore line," about 625 feet higher than the present lake.—Pathfinder Magazine.
