turns OLD HEAT PLANT INTO NEW

Modernization at Low Cost
Saves Expense of Com-
plete Replacement.

Modernize your present furnace
this fall instead of scrapping it for a
new one, the Holland Institute of
Thermology of Holland, Mich., ad-
vises home-owners who are carrying
out home-modernizing programs but
are trying to do so economically.

If the grate, firepot or combustion
chamber of the heating plant is
cracked or burnt out, it must be re-
placed. But other defects can be
eliminated by adding new equipment
to the existing heating plant, which
costs a moderate fraction of the price
of a new plant. In many homes, the
heating plant is substantially all
right, yet one or more rooms persist-
ently refuse to stay warm. Or else,
though the system is efficient in av-
erage winter weather, it may be nec-
essary to force it during severe cold
spells.

Big Improvement at Small Cost.

Such defects can be forestalled by
inexpensive modernization. No mat-
ter what make of warm air circulat-
ing plant is in the home, the trouble
can be corrected by the addition of
a motor-driven fan. This is done by
taking off the upper part of the fur-
nace-casing, suspending the fan in-
side it and having the motor at-
tached above the furnace. This mo-
tor-fan combination can be installed
without inconvenience even on a cold
day when the furnace is fired to ca-
pacity.

More than 30 tests on this "air-
you-well" heating plant fan were re-
cently completed by the department
of engineering research of the Uni-
versity of Michigan. From these
tests, the engineers drew the follow-
ing conclusions:

First, the fan-unit creates posi-
tive air-flow through the long heat
pipes. Second, it creates uniform air
distribution to all rooms, regardless
of their size or distance from the cen-
tral heating plant. Third, it produces
positive ventilation, air circulation
and, in hot weather, actual lowering
of the air-temperature in the house
from two to seven degrees. Fourth,
the power-cost amounts to a fraction
of a cent an hour.

Warms Up Cool Rooms.

From this test-report, it can be
seen how this modern item of equip-
ment "takes the curse off" the far
corner rooms that never could be
properly heated, for it substitutes
mechanical propulsion of air for the
old gravity-system and therefore
forces air into the parts of the house
to which it might not flow otherwise.

Also, the fan-unit, by keeping the
air flowing from the upstairs rooms
to the central heating plant and back
again more frequently, considerably
modifies the temperature of the whole
system. This means that, when the
fire is burning rapidly on a cold day,
the heat is taken away from the cen-
tral plant quickly, before it becomes
over-heated. This tends to eliminate
the danger of burnt-out furnace-parts
and the disagreeable and costly re-
pairs that they cause. Besides, it
makes for economy by preventing the
need for forcing the furnace and by
delivering all the heat available to
the places that need it.

HOME POINTERS

DEVIL'S FOOD

1 cup butter

1 cup sugar

2 egg yolks

1/4 cup milk

1 1/4 cups flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

2 egg whites

2 squares chocolate

Grated rind of 1/4 orange

Cream butter; add gradually, one-
half the sugar and melted cho-
colate. Beat yolks of eggs until
thick and lemon-colored, and
add gradually the remaining su-
gar. Combine mixtures, and add
milk, alternately, with flour, sift-
ed with baking powder; then add
whites of eggs, beaten stiff, and
grated orange rind. Bake forty-
five to fifty minutes. Frost with
boiled orange frosting. When frost-
ing is cool, spread a thin coat of
grated chocolate over the top.

BOILED CAKE FROSTING

1 cup sugar

1-3 cup orange juice

Grated rind 1 orange

1 egg white

In a smooth agate saucepan
put sugar and orange juice and
rind, mix well, and boil, being
careful not to stir or disturb syr-
up until it will spin a long
thread when it drips from tip of
spoon. Lift gently from fire, and
pour slowly, while beating
vigorously with a strong egg-
beater, in a fine steam onto egg
white which has been beaten
until light but not stiff. Con-
tinue beating until frosting is
stiff enough to stay in place
pour all at once onto cake and
spread over surface with a few
movements of a large flat knife.

DATE GEMS

1 cup flour

5 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 cup graham flour

1 cup chopped dates

1 1/4 cups milk

2 tablespoons melted butter or
other fat

Sift flour, baking powder and
salt together. Add graham
flour and dates and mix thor-
oughly. Add milk and butter
slowly, stirring constantly. Pour
into greased muffin pans and
bake in moderate oven 25 to 30
minutes. This makes 12 muffins.
