Ayer of Branford, now serving his third term in the office. Despite his years and affliction, Ayer is strong and active. In his youth—before excessive study robbed him of his sight, he was captain of the Amherst college from Yale Divinity school. The blind chaplain heads an organization known as the Society for the Handicapped, a group which seeks to alleviate the misfortune of the blind in Connecticut. During the World War he donned overalls and managed a sizable "war garden." In addition, he milked five cows, fed three yearlings, two calves and twenty-five hens and raised ninety-two chickens.—Indianapolis News.
