Many Students Earn

All of Own Way at
Oregon University

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eu-
gene.—Approximately three-fourths
of the students of the University of
Oregon are wholly or partially self-sup-
porting, it is announced by Earl M.
Pallett, registrar. Figures just com-
piled for this term show that only 813
out of 2,840 enrolled on the Eugene
campus depend on their parents for
entire support. Figures for the med-
ical school, Portland, and other exten-
sion centers, and correspondence stu-
dents are not available, but it is be-
lieved that nearly all of these make
all or nearly all of their own living.

The number of men who are self-
supporting is much greater than the
number of women, and out of a total
of 1,546 men only 151 do not earn all
or part of their way. The number of
men who are entirely "on their own"
is 560, more than one-third.

"The fact that 107 senior men out
of 242, and 51 senior women out of
232 are wholly self-supporting indicates
that students who must make their own
way in life realize the value of uni-
versity training enough to actually
earn it at a sacrifice," points out Mr.
Pallett. "It is also significant to note
that out of the total of 242, only 14
men of the senior class are wholly de-
pendent upon others for support."

Men taking graduate work show an
even higher percentage of self-support,
since 36 of the 54 are wholly self-sup-
porting, and only one is dependent
wholly upon others for his entire fund.

Whole Family Likes This Basement



"ON WITH THE DANCE" is the order of the evening in the home that has a music room all fitted up in the basement. No rugs have to be rolled up nor furniture moved, nor are the more serious members of the family disturbed in their reading or serious conversations upstairs. But every one who knows the latest steps or wants to hear the most pepful jazz or see the latest movie finds his way down to the dance room and home theater.

Not every basement lends itself to such an arrangement but many of them do and thoughtful builders are making provision for this in new homes. The plan shown here is taken from an actual house and is practicable in every respect.

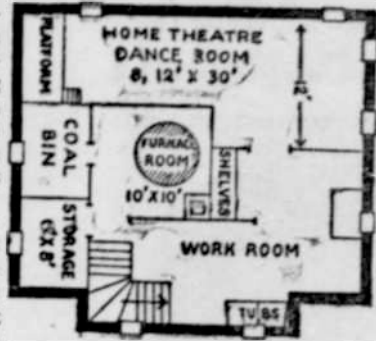
The heating plant, of course, has right of way in every basement, as upon this depends the comfort and health of the entire family. The Holland warm air heating system should be placed as near to the center of the house as possible and close to the fuel room, which, in turn, is located with a view to being filled conveniently from the outside. Then economy demands that the laundry tubs be placed underneath the kitchen or bathroom so that the supply pipes and waste stack may be tapped at a minimum of cost. The rest of the basement may be partitioned off for storage and recreational purposes.

The dance room shown here is kept warm and dry by the furnace. The coal bin is large enough to contain a winter's supply of fuel at a single filling. The Holland vapor-air system operates so efficiently that it requires a minimum of coal. This furnace will bring a night-cooled house up to 70 or 72 degrees of warmth on a midwinter morning after the draft has been open less than an hour. That is, it requires a minimum of forcing—and it is forcing rather than steady moderate combustion which eats into the coal pile.

Not only the basement, but the entire house, profits from the fact that the Holland heating plant holds its heat for hours. This makes for real comfort, and another feature of the equipment that contributes to comfort and good health is the new type of humidifier which is an integral part of the vapor-air plant.

Whereas the water-pan in the ordinary warm air furnace evaporates a gallon of water a day, the humidifier in this heater consumes from three to twenty-five gallons a day, maintaining a relative humidity of 40 per cent, which scientists and heating and ventilating authorities agree is ideal for the family's health.

A small platform is built at one end of the room, for amateur dramatics or the home orchestra. A floor should be laid for dancing, and this may be done inexpensively with battislap linoleum surfaced with varnish.



Modern Heaters Conserve Health

The average warm air heat-
ing system which is more than ten
years old is far behind the advance
of scientific discoveries is the de-
clination of heating experts of the
Holland Institute of Thermology, Hol-
land, Mich.

"Modern warm air heating is the
most economical and efficient of all
forms of providing warmth in the
home," according to the Institute,
"but up to ten years ago the install-
ers of warm air systems relied on
rule-of-thumb methods."

"But today the up-to-date installer has
at his command scientific data that en-
able him to estimate with decimal ac-
curacy the needs of a home and the
size of the equipment to supply them."

Adequate sizes, sufficient slope
to insure rapid travel of warm air,
short heat runs and a host of other
factors are parts of his calculations.

"Of course, the most important fac-
tor in modern warm air heating is the
improved design of the plant. The
standard warm air circulating heater
is designed in only seven pieces, or
castings, which are fitted together
with double cup-joints sealed with as-
bestos cement. The modern con-
stantly grate material savings of
fuel through improved combustion,
which extracts the last possible heat-
units from the fuel. The same may
be said of the modern slotted fire-
box."

"Whereas the old type water-pan
turned a gallon of water a day into
harmful moisture for the air in the
home, the new automatic humidifier
evaporates from 3 to 25 gallons a
day, making the proper relative hu-
midity easy to maintain."

The latest advance in the science
of warm air heating, according to the
Holland Institute of Thermology, is
the introduction of a motor-fan unit
which substitutes mechanical propul-
sion of the air for the force of grav-
ity. It provides "super-circulation"
of vaporized warm air in place of the
old gravity circulation.

The Mountain States transmission
