At present writing a second school bond election seems certain. Petitions have been circulated and according to the Oregon School Law it is mandatory upon the School board to call the election. (Section 156, page 55, Oregon School Laws, last edition.)

As I have come into contact with many people since the first election, I feel that there is a great misunderstanding of this bond issue, and of the intentions of the school board in regard to the improvement of our school plant. I would like to present this \$30,000 bond issue to you in a different way. At present the valuation of property in District No. 48 is \$1,140,000. Let in this district with around \$811,140.
