Council Discusses Important Problems

Delegation from Kiwanis

Club Speaks For The
Watt's Air Port

C. OF C. LETTER READ

Payment of Monthly Bills Is All
That Is Really Accomplished

Probably the payment of the monthly bills was the most that was really accomplished at the regular meeting of the Town Council held Monday evening at the City Hall. That, however, did not detract much of the time spent in deliberations.

As soon as the monthly bills were disposed of, the Recorder read a letter from the secretary of the Beaverton Chamber of Commerce to the effect that the Chamber at their regular meeting had passed a motion to go on record as in favor of an "Occupation Tax."

This letter aroused considerable discussion, J. W. Raynard, who was present at the meeting taking the floor in favor of the measure. But the only thing really done was to tacitly agree to refer the matter to the City Attorney when he was present at a meeting.

The next matter to come up was presented by a delegation from the local Kiwanis club. President Talbert, and Henry Davenport with Mr. Raynard spoke in the interests of the Watt's Airport saying that it was possible to make this a "Class A" port provided some wires were removed which are said to obstruct the landing and take-off of the heavy commercial type of plane. These gentlemen spoke at some length and received the consent of the Council to bring representatives of the companies interested and the manager of the airport, Mr. Davis to meet with the city fathers next Monday evening for a joint conference to see just what could be done and to see what was required. Some expressed the opinion that about half a mile of wires would have to be removed or placed in conduits underground.

Following the discussion of the difficulties of the airport, A. M. Hocken requested action on getting water to property in which he is interested which lays on the Highway at the western boundary of the Aown. This section never has been served by water from the City except where property owners had put in water lines for themselves. At first it was stated that a four-inch line should be laid from Cedar St. to the city limits west. It was finally agreed to lay a two-inch line from the Green Clover Barbecue to the west City limits. This line will be laid along the line of the new highway survey.

Committee Working To Reduce Fares

Ten ride Bearer Tickets
May Be Used With An
Increase In Price

TWO PLANS GIVEN

At Fairvale Meeting Al Melin
Is Chosen As President

An interesting meeting was held in the directors' room at the Bank of Beaverton last week on Wednesday evening, May 29, when the joint committee from the Aloha Community club, the Huber Commercial club, the Beaverton Chamber of Commerce and the Fairvale club met to discuss the commuter rates between this vicinity and the metropolis of Oregon.

This joint committee grew out of a meeting held at Fairvale Monday evening, May 13, when a goodly number from this vicinity met with the club at that place. At last week's meeting, Mr. Al Melin, representing Fairvale, presided. Mr. James, the manager of the Pacific Stages, who was present representing the transportation companies, made two propositions to the members of the joint committee. One was that the transportation companies put back the former commuter ten-ride bearer tickets with a slight increase in price. He stated that the former price had been based on a charge of two cents per mile, and this he thought should be increased to two and a quarter cents per mile.

The committee voted to carry the matter back to their constituents before taking any action on the matter. Mr. James thought that the companies would grant a longer time on the fifty-ride books provided they establish a minimum price at which they were to be sold, say \$5.00 or thereabouts. This did not strike the Fairvale representative very favorably, but the others seemed to be a little better impressed with the proposition.

The Aloha man, Mr. C. J. Stickney was of the opinion that there would be a bus line established over the new Canyon road as soon as that was in shape for travel. He did not go into details as to who was going to establish it but Mr. James said that he did not think the companies now operating would raise any objection before the Public Service Commission if such an enterprise should be started. He expressed himself as being in favor of keeping up the luxurious accommodations now offered before taking any steps to bring down the price of transportation, as lowering the price must, in his opinion lower the quality, that is cheaper busses, solid tires, little upholstering on the seats, etc.

ASSEMBLY PROGRAMS WILL BE BROADCAST

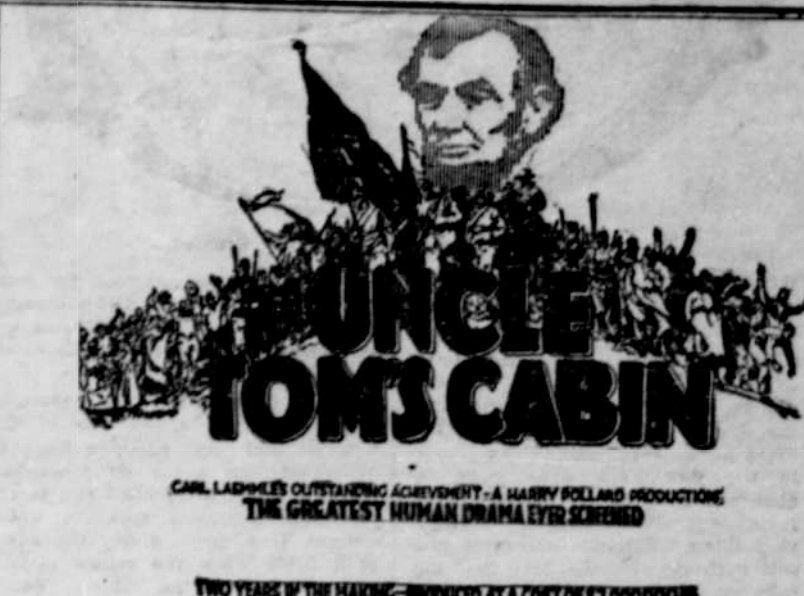

R. B. Day Passes To Great Beyond

VERY FOND OF SPORTS

Funeral Is Largest Ever Held For
Local Man by Local Mortician

What is said to be the largest funeral ever held for a resident of this community conducted by the local mortician was held from the Cathedral Saturday morning at nine thirty when the last rites were said over the remains of Robert B. Day, the father of Edward, Lawrence and Evelyn Day.

Robert B. Day was born February 12, 1881 at Guelph, Ontario. As a small boy he migrated with his parents to Portland, when it was rather a small, scattered town.

He attended the Portland schools and is said to have for a time been a pupil at the Union school west of Cedar Mills. His boyhood sports consisted of swimming and playing along what is now Portland's great waterfront.

His athletic ability was early manifest, boxing being his especial delight and sport. He at one time held the Pacific Coast amateur lightweight championship, holding this title for four years, and retiring undefeated. His ability to recall old-time fighters and their records was the marvel of his many friends.

He associated later with the Olympic and the Columbus athletic clubs, which, however, have passed into obscurity a good many years ago. His love for sports was shown throughout his whole life, the local high school furnishing many a joyous season since his coming to his vicinity eight years ago.

He first located with his family on this side of Johnson Creek, on the south side of the Hillsboro road just beyond Johnson road. While there he constructed his home on the other side of the creek and north of the road where he has resided with his family for the past few years. There he had a fifteen acre tract where he was building up with the aid of the family a neat, modern country home during the time when many other workmen were finding it difficult to pass the time away.

On October 9, 1906 he was united in marriage to Miss Susie Mueller of Portland, and to this union three children, Edward, Lawrence and Evelyn, were born, all of whom, with the widow survive.

For the past thirty-one years he has been associated with the Oregon Casket Company of Portland. He passed away rather suddenly, having suffered but a short time with pneumonia. His death came as a shock to his many friends. He was laid to rest at Mt. Calvary cemetery Saturday, Rev. Fr. O'Neil of the Beaverton St. Cecilia church, where Mr. Day attended church, officiating. We remember Mr. Day as a genial, smiling friend, ever ready to do a good turn for anyone in need. He will be missed as the years go by, not only by the bereaved family but by his neighbors and friends as well as by the fellow workers in the establishment where he has spent so many hours.
