Tilt Enlivens the Council Session

Raynard and Manning Dis-
cuss Extent of Airport
Expenses

ALLEN GIVES REPORT

Many Of City's Affairs Of Our City
Attended To At Specia Meeting

Quite a lively tilt took place at the special meeting of the Council Monday evening between former Councilman Raynard and Councilman Manning over the extent of expense which would be warranted in incurring and who should bear the expense of taking down wires which seem to interfere with the landing of aeroplanes at the local airport. The Council have the right to order such changes made as they think warranted in the location of wiring, poles, cables or such matters. Whether the Council feels warranted in ordering anything done before the parties concerned, the West Coast Telephone Co., and the Portland Electric Power Co., on the one side and the engineer at Watt's airport on the other, had an opportunity of arriving at an agreement, seemed to be the contention. Alderman Manning was of the opinion that the public utility companies should be given a chance to say whether or not they were going to make the changes required. Mr. Raynard seemed to be of the opinion that as the Council had the right to require the changes made, they should go ahead and order these changes. George Bauman representing the telephone company and E. R. Easter representing the electric company were present at the meeting.

Attorney Allen was present and reported some progress in the matter of the sidewalk along the Meier & Frank Co., property on Front street. He did not think, however, that it was quite time to begin operations though he stated that he had a verbal promise that the company would not remonstrate against such an improvement.

The Council voted to instruct the attorney to send a letter to B. Leis in regard to a hole in the sidewalk in front of his property on Front street. This is a hole caused by the removal of a gas tank from under the sidewalk.

Steps were taken to attend to matter of the open drain along the S. P. right-of-way. Just the procedure that will be taken was not definitely decided but the railroad is to be asked for plans and specifications and estimates of cost in making the improvement. While probably not definitely stated, it seemed to be the sense of the meeting that the town would help pay for the improvement as the drain is the outlet for storm sewers from over a large part of the town.

A letter from W. B. Clark, state highway engineer, was read which requested the removal of that part of the pipe line east of town lying under where the highway is to be paved, and an iron pipe laid crossing the road at right angles to the right-of-way. The letter was placed on file.

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE DISCUSSED FAIRLY

In the discussion of the present school problem before the people every effort has been made on the part of those in favor of our bond issue to present all the facts. These facts are based upon actual expenditures as taken from books kept by the school clerk or have been obtained from the Oregon Voter, a publication which has no interest whatever in printing anything that might have a bias one way or the other. It has been our purpose to inform the people about their school system. It is their right and privilege to know how the money is spent. We maintain that the school's finances have been conducted along lines of economy and common sense. We arrive at this conclusion from a comparison of the cost of maintaining our schools in the state of Oregon. We believe that in making a fair estimate of the future needs of our community that this change in our school plant is necessary.

Opposition to this plan exists in the community and we have wished that an open and fair discussion of the matter by the opposition could be made. The books of the school clerk are open to the public and the clerk has expected and has been willing to devote time to the explanation of the expenditures of the school district to anyone who might wish to get definite information. The only organized opposition to the bond issue that we know of is the so-called "Taxpayers League." Not one of the officers of that league or anyone else has tried to obtain information from the clerk's books. Why have they not done this? Why do they fight this bond issue without getting definite information about our school when it is so easy to obtain it? These are fair questions. Our school system is one of the vital things of our community. With the exception of our churches there is nothing else that holds such an important place. And it is the duty of every one to approach this matter in a spirit of fairness and broadmindedness. Those who are in favor of this bond issue have come out openly and have tried in a sincere way to acquaint the people of Beaverton with their reasons for being for it. They have at no time made statements which have not been backed up with figures from a reliable source. We made our open statements early so that a chance would be given the opposition to refute anything we might say. Last bond election the so-called "Taxpayers League" brought out statements at the eleventh hour. No one was given time to answer those statements. Possibly their intentions are to do likewise in this election. If such are their intentions we shall leave with the public of Beaverton the decision as to which side is conducting the fairer campaign. Those of you who are not thoroughly acquainted with the facts as to the finances of our school system as they have been discussed in our local papers will find practically all the figures that have been presented displayed in a window near the postoffice. Please see these and refresh your memory and knowledge before you vote.

In almost all of the discussion of our school issue the question of dollars and cents has been more before the public than anything else. We almost forget that there is another side. The matter as to whether we lose prestige to Hillsboro, as to whether we shall be ready for the growth that is sure to come to our community when our canyon road is completed is not the most important thing. The question as to whether our community is going to make it possible for our boys and girls to have their chance to get the proper preparation for life's work—is the one of most importance. Many are objecting to our buses, but our buses make an education possible for boys and girls 8 or 10 miles out who could not by any other means have this opportunity. These boys and girls that we bring here

Facts Concerning Proposed Building

Reports Said To Be Circulating Bring Forth This
Citation Of Facts

COST HELD VERY LOW

Chairman Sets Forth This Signed
Statement To Refute Report

In view of the fact that reports are being circulated regarding the excessive cost of our proposed changed school plant, the school board wish to go on record as follows:

First: We did our best to secure the advice of an experienced architect—one who has recently built a number of schools in Oregon. He estimates the cost at not to exceed \$35,000.

Second: The school board will not accept a contract for more than that—and will do their best to make it less.

Third: If the contract cannot be let for \$35,000 or less, they will not start the building at all.

Fourth: We shall see to it that the man who takes the contract is under bond by a responsible bonding company. If the contractor does not make good, the bonding company will make good. It will NOT COST THE DISTRICT MORE THAN \$35,000.

One of the new creations of the season, which are being prepared, is the huge Fiery Spider, which effect is encased in a magnificent bomb, hurled from giant mortar. The claws of the fiery creature writhe in the sky seeming to cover the air.

Recent inventions have eliminated the dangers and hazards of the fireworks display. Special expert representatives of the Hitt company will have entire charge of the pyrotechnic program.

The KGW ten-piece orchestra, of Portland, has been secured to play for the dance during the celebration and for the queen's ball and coronation ceremonies to be held in the auditorium Wednesday night, July 3. Beaverton Boys Take Both Games Sunday

Games Played At Home In-
stead of Aloha as First
Planned

NEW FACES ARE SEEN

Second Game A Real Scram In Try
At Getting An Even Score Then

Beaverton took both games of the double-header with Aloha Sunday on the local grounds. The games had been scheduled to be played at Aloha but through mutual agreement, it was decided that they should be played on the Beaverton grounds.

The first game was quite one-sided all the way through. Aloha got the first run in the first inning but failed to score again until in the eighth when McLean, first man up, got hit and having stolen second and third got home on Barry's, the Beaverton catcher's wild throw to third.

Beaverton did not score until in the third when Groff, their pitcher and the first man up got a double and scored on Groff's single. This was followed by Barron and Halstein each getting safe hits. The side retired when Aloha short stop threw Eckstein out at first.

The second game was much more interesting. Though Beaverton took the lead at the score board, they were tied several times and passed near the end of the game. This game was not to go but seven innings as the weather was dark and cloudy, the air chilly and the hour late. At the end of the sixth, Aloha stood ahead, 4-3 and though they failed to score in the seventh, they held to two out and only one on bases when Jamieson was called to bat for Halston. "Jimmie" hit the first ball pitched to him for a single which scored Harris then on third. This tied the score.

Aloha to bat first in the eighth got three runs. Looked like the game was all over. But the Aloha pitcher blew up, allowed three walks, hit one man with a pitched ball, and allowed three safe hits.

The faces were almost all new on the team. Manager Clinton has been getting out and scouring the vicinity for players. As a result, he has a much younger bunch of fellows who work better together than did the team last year. Barry, Barron, Halston and probably Woodward and Eckstein would be familiar to most of us. GOOD MEETING HELD

President Commends The Committee
On Excellent Work On Float

On account of the number of members of the Beaverton Chamber of Commerce being engaged in other matters Tuesday evening, the regular meeting scheduled for that evening was not held until the following evening, Wednesday, in the I. O. O. F. hall. Probably as many as has attended a meeting of that sort excepting when there was a luncheon served attended the meeting that evening. Numerous committees reported and considerable business of rather an important nature was transacted and several who have not been in the habit of attending meetings of this sort expressed themselves as being very well pleased with the gathering.

President Pinder was present but after calling the meeting to order turned the chair over to F. J. Deitch who took his place and in a very pleasing manner expressed the appreciation of the community for the most excellent work done by those in charge of the Beaverton float which carried off first place in the recent Rose festival held in Portland.

Following the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting the chairman called for reports from committees which had been appointed at the last meeting. C. E. Hedge, chairman of a committee to look into the matter of securing right-of-way for the proposed widening of the highway reported having secured several options on property, and that in no case did there seem any attempt to ask more than was reasonable for the property which would be used in the proposed widening. The public library came up for discussion following remarks by J. W. Sprague and Jas. Lewis, H. M. Barnes and J. W. Sprague were appointed a committee to report at the next meeting as to the matter of putting this project on a firm financial basis.

The committee on fares from here to Portland was not present and so there was no report from it.

W. L. Cady explained the manner in which a village delivery system might be installed and the chamber voted to instruct the secretary to write a letter to the postoffice department requesting that such a delivery system be established. This letter to the department is followed by letters from as many of the business men and residents of the town as can be induced to write. There was a committee appointed, Messrs. Schultz, Pinder and Sprague, who were instructed to encourage as many as possible to write these letters.

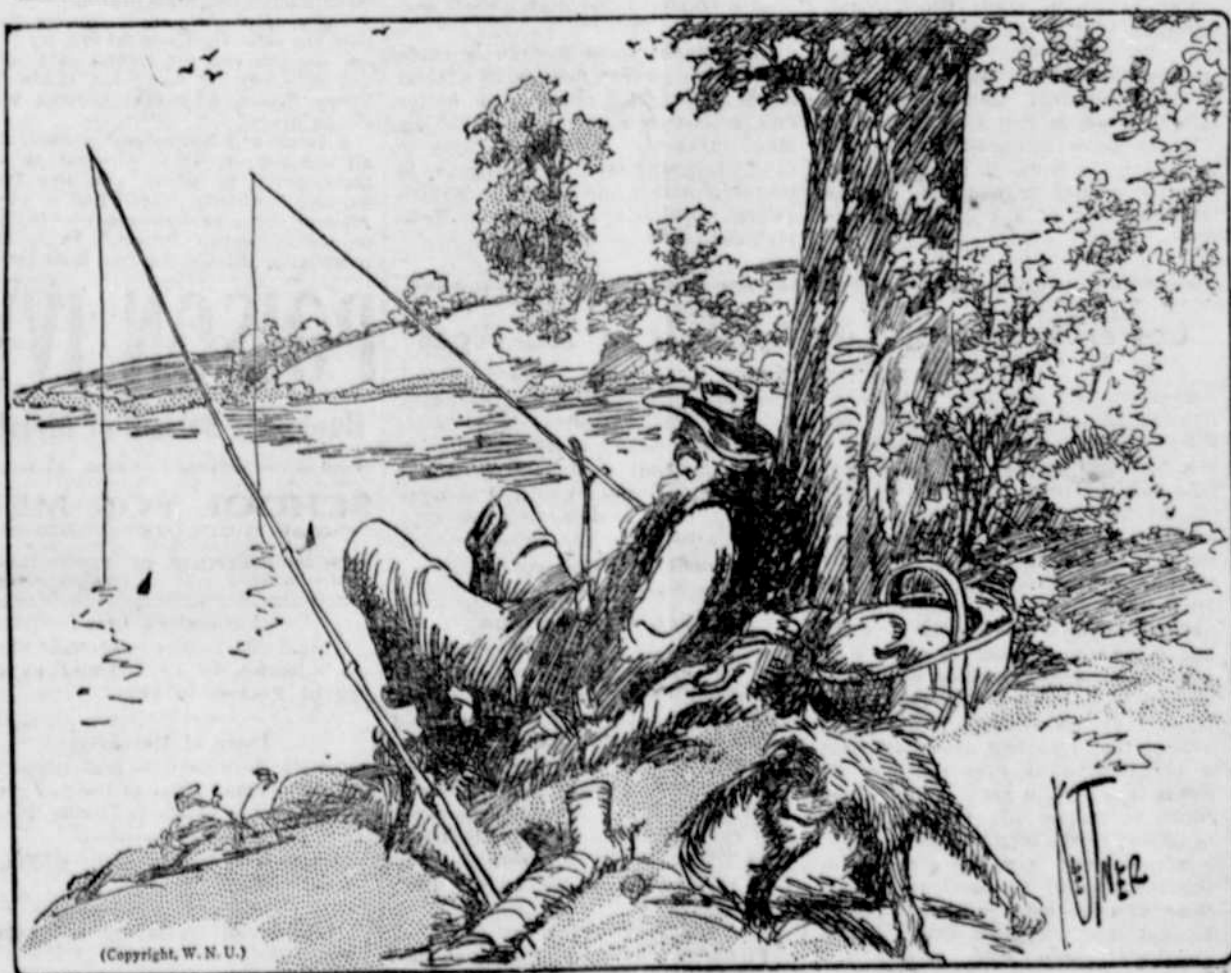
After these letters are written, the chamber and the residents of the vicinity are to write the representatives and get as many as they can of others with political influence to write these representatives to get this matter pushed through to completion at as early a date as possible.

A request from Hillsboro Chamber that Beaverton offer a prize for the first of the contestants to reach Beaverton in the "bunion derby" that is being staged July Fourth between Portland and Hillsboro, be offered a prize, was granted and E. Stipe and J. W. Raynard were appointed a committee to decide the winners. This request also contained an invitation to Queen Irene, the winner in the Miss Beaverton Contest, to be the guest of the Hillsboro Chamber during the coming celebration at the County Seat.

The Rose Festival Float Committee made a preliminary report but as all the bills were not yet in, they are to make final report at the next meeting. Something more than \$300, counting the sales of votes, receipts from the card party, donations and prize money will have been received. The cost of the float was considerably more this year than on previous years but the committee expects that about \$150 will be left after all the bills are paid.
