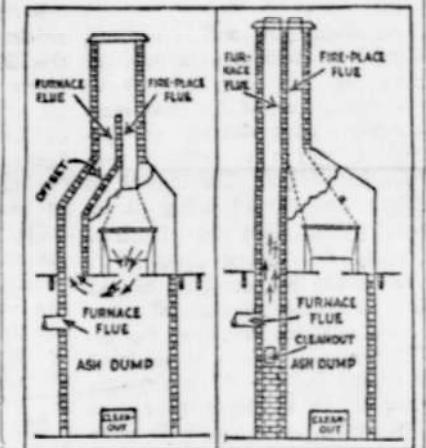
RESTRICTED FLUE CHOKES OFF FIRE IN HEATING PLANT

Few home-owners realize, points out
the Holland Institute of Thermology
of Holland, Mich., that it takes the
oxygen of from 10 to 20 pounds of
air to burn one pound of coal com-
pletely. This is why the size of chimney
flue is so essential to perfect per-
formance by the heating plant.

Height of the chimney controls the
speed of the draft moving through the
heater, but the area of the flue's open-
ing governs the volume of air that
the draft draws through the fuel-
bed.

For small heaters, the area of the
opening of the chimney-flue should be
at least 25 square inches. For stoves
and ranges, the minimum area should
be 40 square inches. Fifty square
inches is the minimum for a fireplace
flue, though a safer rule to follow
is that the chimney-opening should
be one-twelfth the dimensions of the
opening in the mantel. The minimum
flue-area for a central heating plant,
be it of any system including the mod-
ern warm air circulating type, is 70
inches.

This area should be continuous
from the base of the chimney to its
very top. This means that the flue
should be perfectly straight; turns
or "offsets" should be avoided. Often

when there is a fireplace in the liv-
ing-room and a central heating plant
in the basement, the flues from both
are united in one chimney for econ-
omy's sake. This means that either
the fireplace flue or the heater flue
must be offset.

When this is absolutely unavoidable,
the Holland Institute of Thermology's
engineers recommend, the offset
should be in the fireplace flue rather
than in that serving the central heat-
er. Also, the flues should be carried
up separately to the top.

Offsets in flues form catch-pockets
for accumulation of soot and dirt,
which decrease heating efficiency, in-
crease fire-hazard and tend to make
the home dirty. To avoid these dan-
gers, thorough cleaning of the whole
heating plant by the suction cleaner
method has become a regular part of
the spring house cleaning program in
countless homes.

Chair of Religion Is Established at O.S.C.

Oregon State College, Corvallis.—
privately supported, non-sectarian
chair of religion became a reality
here with the organization of a state
wide committee to back the venture
which has been in preliminary op-
eration all this year, sponsored by a
few individuals.

Dr. E. W. Warrington, for many
years Y. M. C. A. secretary on the
campus, has been named professor
of religion and will teach a series of
courses of strictly collegiate grade
for which credit will be given. Dr.

two years graduate study in re-

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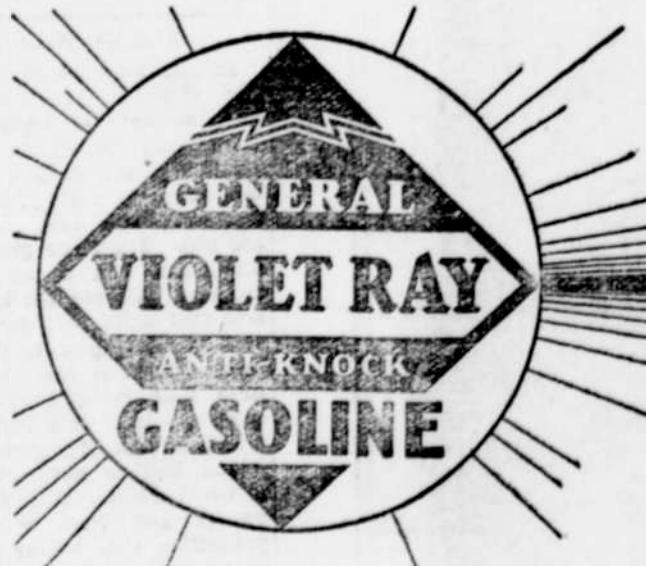
