The Roosevelt Highway south of Madison is being oiled. Canby has recently purchased a quantity of new fire hose. The Union O. J. Company's plant at Umatilla is about completed. The Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield has undergone considerable repairs. A \$96,000 contract for paving the business section at Burns has just been let. The Oregon City rodeo grounds are to be dedicated July 2 by a big celebration. The road leading to the new high school building at Tillamook is now complete. About \$250,000 will be spent on the new wing at the Good Samaritan hospital. The sawmill that burned recently at Aurora is being rebuilt and will be in operation soon. The Valley Junction Service Station at Willamina has been greatly improved just recently. Woodburn is to have a new dr. goods store which will be located in the Settlemier building. A bus line has recently been started between Baker and Portland by the Union Pacific Stages, Inc. Plans are now under way in Hillsboro for the laying of considerable new sidewalk and the asphaltting of an outlying street. The timber company at Jewel has changed hands and the new proprietors expect to start operations in the near future. A new high school and grad school building to cost \$38,000 is to be erected at Myrtle Creek to replace the two buildings recently burned there.

Gresham will purchase new fire fighting equipment on which bids were opened June 19. Contracts have been awarded for the construction of walks along Maple street in Myrtle Point. Construction is well under way at Grants Pass on a box factory which will have a \$40,000 annual payroll. The Oregon State College department of home economics has been completely equipped with electrical appliances this spring. The Oregon State Highway Commission has just started rebuilding the Salem to Portland section of the east side Pacific Highway. The proprietor of the Coffee Cup restaurant adds business so good that he will add another dining room to his place at Roseburg. A large creamery is to be built at La Grande to handle the growing volume of dairy business being developed around that city. Six mines in Baker county have been accepted under the name of consolidated Oregon Gold Mines, Ltd. A large mill will be erected in the near future. KINTON HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING There were about 50 present at the annual school meeting at the school house Monday evening at Kinton at which time occurred the election of officers for the year. MOLALLA TO HOLD RODEO JULY 2, 3, 4 All preparations have been made for the big buckaroo at Molalla July 2-3-4 and the city is anticipating a monster three day crowd. Molalla is the ideal place for a rodeo, being close to all cities and yet away from the highway jam which is sure to be congested during the holidays. Governor Patterson, Secretary of State and Mrs. Hess and the nationally known Henry Collins of Penopen the show July 2 which will be Clackamas and Marion county day. There will be music games and surprises for "bronco" fans never attempted before. Here is a list of some notables and the best in their line: Vera McGinnis, champion cow girl, Bonnie Gray, queen of horse women, Ed. Wright, world's great clown, "Micky and Dicky," two survivors. Also Norman Cowan, twice winner of the Roosevelt trophy, Sid and Art Seal, the Hollywood movie stars, and Frank Studnik, the prince of the bareback riders. There will be scores of others in the arena who are known from ocean to ocean. All children under ten years of age accompanied by their parents will be admitted free July 2. There is a big treat in store for the kiddies. Governor Patterson will be made a real Buckaroo on July 2 when Henry Collins will present him a specially made ten gallon sombrero. A carload of wild steers will keep the show boys stepping in the arena. Newly covered seats and bleachers add much to the wild west headquarters. There is ample free parking space for automobiles and no danger of being injured on the highway. The Buckaroo is annual event sponsored by the fire boys of Molalla to help their town. It is not a private enterprise and not a cent is ever taken by the boys for their hard work and efforts. It is a public affair and the community work and consequently will draw crowds of people. The pageant "The End of the Old Oregon Trail" is under the direction of Prof. Evans. The Buckaroo is without doubt an attraction of great merit and is considered one of the best in the country.
