Secretary Bennett of Tillamook Gives Talk On "The Under Privileged Child"

"ALL-KIWANIS NIGHT"

Last Day Is Only Day She Drives After 6 o'clock Sees Many Accidents

DELAYED BY STORM

Average Cost of Gas Is 27¢. Once Paid As High As 35¢

Left Beaverton on Monday, May 20th at 6 a.m. Arrived in Baker, Oregon, at 6 p.m. On to America Falls following evening at 6:10 p.m. Left 6 a.m. arrived at Salt Lake City at noon. Wednesday check out gas mileage was 25 miles up to Salt Lake City, Utah. After that 18 miles as the gasoline is much lower test in the middle-west, an didn't have high test gasoline until I reached Boise on return trip. Much tire trouble on sharp rock in Wyoming and others had same trouble. Hadn't started road-work and the snow had carried on coars sharp rock which was dragged with road machinery and only had one nail puncture near Pocatello Idaho on return trip. Made average drive over 420 miles every day. Drove 576 miles into Omaha last day. Arrived Omaha 9 o'clock, Saturday evening. Only driving did after 6 o'clock, was my last one. Drove until nine. Played eleven holes of golf on Sunday morning in Omaha, Neb. That will show you just how fatigued I was. Stayed Sunday and Sunday night in Omaha, drove on to Sioux City, Iowa. Leaving Omaha 12:30 p.m. arrive at Sioux City at 4 o'clock, having had lunch in Blair, Neb. I kept accurate account of expenses, time and mileage as that gave us something to occupy us. As scenery is very much the same thru most of the states where the Lincoln Highway goes. Had every kind of weather—cyclone, cloud bursts, and the famous electrical storms. I was favored with all. Coming back I left Sioux City at 12:30 p.m. Monday, May 27th, detouring until Omaha—had breakfast, and bridges out. Arrive Lincoln, Neb., 5:15. Just stopped. Next day to Sidney, Neb., and next Parnoo, Wyo. was held up 15 miles west of Medicine Bow, Wyo. in sand storm for 8 hours until wind let up, so I could see road. Pitted the wind shield, side wing and cut point off front of car. On my made 276 miles that day. As I hours stop cuts down the day light quite a bit. Into Pocatello, Idaho Thursday evening at 6:10 p.m. M. Marsh arrived at Pocatello at 5:10 p.m. which really was good connections. I intended to be there noon Thursday, but sand storm permitting. Must have been eight cars stopped near mine, and all just waiting.

Saw several had car accidents. On car nearly swiped us off road. Blown on loose gravel and went off road not more than 21 feet in front of my car. With much force an there were three in car, and looked very much like one, as they were all huddled up on floor of car over steering wheel. I pulled very dazed elderly lady out through door and th
