Automobile Crash On Street Causes Arrest

Parker Was Driving At An Excessive Rate Of Speed Driving On Broadway

IS ALLOWED FREEDOM

Parker Is Placed Under Arrest And Taken To County Bastille

Quite a considerable excitement was aroused Friday afternoon when the machine driven by Francis Parker of Cedar Mills crashed into and just about wrecked a car driven by Geo. Hughton at the corner of Broadway and East Streets.

By-standers who saw the accident say that Parker was driving at an excessive rate of speed. He was going west on Broadway when Hughton, coming from the east, came to make the turn to drive into his garage. In doing so he was forced to cross the street directly in front of the machine driven by Parker.

Parker was placed under arrest by Justice Hedge and Constable Desinger took him to Hillsboro, where he is said to have stayed in the county bastille for some time. Saturday morning, he posted \$100 cash fine with the Justice and was allowed his freedom but ordered to appear for arraignment at ten o'clock of July 5.

Thos. Tongue represented him and is said to have suggested that should the Justice agree to impose a fine not to exceed \$25 that his client would be advised to plead guilty. If the fine was to be over that amount, that a plea of not guilty would be entered.

In that case, the defendant would probably have to be bound over to the grand jury for investigation and their report.

City Fathers Meet In Regular Session

A Short Resume of the Water Situation Is Given By Recorder Thyng

SIDEWALK DISCUSSED

Communication Is Read From Property Owners, Request Hydrant

The regular meeting of the City "Dads" convened in the Town hall at a little past eight o'clock on Monday evening of this week and proceeded to deliberate on the affairs which come under their jurisdiction. Mayor Erickson was not present when the meeting opened but showed up later, while Councilman Manning was absent the entire evening.

A short resume of the water situation was given by Recorder Thyng who reported that during the month of April more than a half of the water purchased by the Town was lost through leakage and that there had been a great improvement made in that situation since then. The leakage has been reduced more than forty per cent and now was not much more than could be expected from wooden pipes which have been in use as long as have those here. Sketchily, the loss in April was in round numbers 130,000 cubic feet, while only about 108,000 cubic feet were sold. During the month of June the loss was 107,000 cubic feet while more than 125,000 cubic feet were sold.

A communication was read from certain property owners asking for the installation of a light and a fire hydrant at the end of Eighth St. This petition was ordered placed on file and the water committee instructed to make an investigation, and also given power to act as they saw fit under the conditions found to exist.

Dr. b. R. Talbert of the local Kiwanis club was present and spoke of the matter of the open ditch along the south S. P. Tracks along Front St. He was accompanied by N. J. Skee, another member of the Kiwanis club and a member of the (the Kiwanian) committee on public relations. Dr. Talbert and Mr. Skee reported that a personal conference with officials of the railroad had been held and these officials would seem to be willing to pay about a half of the cost of getting that place cleaned up but that they, the railroad officials, did not feel it incumbent on them to take the initiative. This initiative, in their opinion should originate with the Town authorities.

The matter of the condition of the sidewalks was taken up, but as Attorney Allen, who has had the matter up for some time, was not present, the Council voted to adjourn until Monday evening of next week.

COWS FROM OREGON ARE TAKEN TO JAPAN

Jersey milk from cows raised in the Willamette Valley will soon be supplied the Emperor of Japan, according to an announcement made by Ivan Loughary, field man for the American Jersey Cattle club, at the County Jersey picnic Sunday, June 30. Mr. Loughary stated that a party of Japanese have been in the valley buying Jersey cattle for the Imperial dairy herd of Japan.

The picnic was attended by approximately 100 Jersey breeders and friends. Dr. O. H. Holmes spoke very interestingly, giving some of his observations concerning farm conditions and law enforcement.

In addition to the talks by Mr. Loughary and Mr. Holmes, Mrs. Walter Sargent sang, and W. F. Cyrus, assistant county agent, spoke briefly.

BUSTER KEATON IS COMING TO THEATRE

Buster Keaton has extracted comedy from steamships and prize fights, bicycles and a locomotive, but now he has hit upon what, so far, seems to be absolutely the funniest thing in his career. He gets his laughs aided and abetted by a new-reel movie camera of ancient vintage, with three tripod legs that get tangled in everything from the New York subway to a motorboat propeller, landing him in the most comical series of troubles he's ever experienced.

This is the situation in "The Cameraman," Keaton's new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer comedy which comes Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, July 7, 8, 9 to the Beaver Theatre. It is a hilarious succession of trials, tribulations and troubles, with a love romance with pretty Marceline Day on the side and a spectacular Chinatown tong war with machine gun embellishments for a huge thrill.

"The Cameraman" was directed by Edward Sedgwick, and shows Keaton as an aspiring newsreel man chasing the elusive "story" in New York.

He gets mixed up in a parade and almost arrested, he tries to film a boat race and gets all mixed up with a churning propeller, he's almost drowned, dragged over the streets—then goes to Chinatown finds himself in a tong war, hides in a pipe to dodge the bullets and is used for a human battering ram by a Chinese attacking army.

Outside of that it's quite uneventful for Buster—as uneventful as sitting on a can of dynamite and pounding it with a hammer.

Much of the picture was taken in New York, including the scenes at the City Hall, the Yankee Stadium, and in Mayor Jimmy Walker's office. A sensational boat race was staged at Newport for the picture. Harold Goodwin plays the "heavy" role, as Stagg, star cameraman, and Buster's rival for Marceline, and Sydney Bracey, Harry Gribbon, and others of note are in the cast.

A complete Chinatown street with five hundred oriental actors marked the big battle scene in the picture and several thousand appear in the heat race sequences and in the huge street scenes in New York.
