Alec Weir Passes On

NOTED MUSICIAN DIES

Kolkenbeck and His Wife Came To
Beaverton About 2 Years Ago

Alec Weir of Cooper Mountain died Monday evening of heart disease. Mr. Weir was born in Chicago, Feb. 25, 1872. He came to Oregon in 1883. He was an employee of the Standard Oil Co., and for 25 years was employed at Linnton, Ore. He retired about 19 years ago, and has been living with his brother, Matt, on a little farm on Cooper Mountain.

He leaves to mourn his loss, a brother, Matt Weir, and two sisters who are living in Portland. The funeral was held from the St. Cecilia Church, Thursday. He was buried in Mt. Calvary in Portland. W. E. in Mt. Calvary cemetery in Portland. W. E. Pegg was in charge of the arrangements.

Emil J. Kolkenbeck died at St. Vincent's hospital on Saturday, July 13. Mr. Kolkenbeck was born in Ohio in 1864, coming to Portland several years ago from Buffalo, N. Y. He was a noted musician. He and his wife came to Beaverton about 2 years ago, and has resided here ever since.

He leaves to mourn his loss, a son who lives about one mile east of Beaverton and his wife Sophia Kolkenbeck. The funeral was held from Pegg's Chapel at 2:30, Tuesday afternoon. The sermon was preached by a Portland minister. Interment was in the Riverview cemetery. Mr. Pegg was in charge of arrangements.

J. C. Bridges, former owner of the Beaverton Exchange, now owned by F. J. Dietsch, died Thursday in Salem. The funeral services were held in Gresham, Saturday. The remains were taken to Tacoma for interment.
