NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the School District bond election hereby called to be held at the high school building of District No. 48 in the City of Beaverton, in and for School District No. 48 of Washington County, Oregon, on Monday, the 29th day of July, 1929, between the hours of two o'clock P. M. and seven o'clock P. M., there will be submitted to the legal voters there of the question of contracting bonded indebtedness in the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of providing fund with which to repair the present high school building, and erect an equip an addition to said building,

in and for said district.
The vote is to be by ballot, upon which shall be the words "Bond—Yes", and "Bond—No"; and the voter shall place a cross (X) between the word "Bonds" and the word "Yes", or between the word "Bonds" and the word "No", while indicates his choice.
