HOW TO MAKE LEMONADE

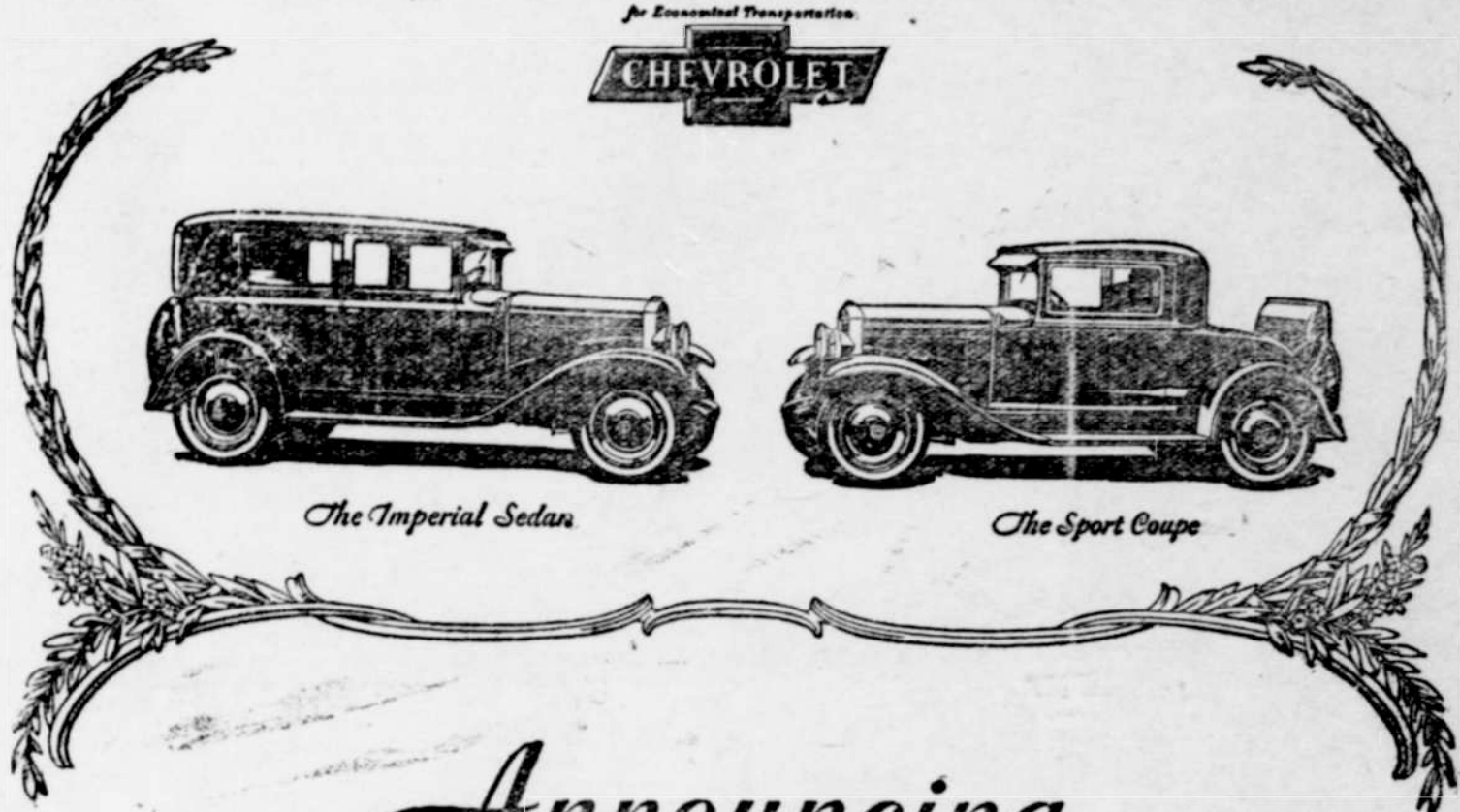
