Building activity is increasing at Vale.

The Union Oil Company of California was granted permission to erect storage plant at Sutherlin.

The Mountain States Power Com-

pany has completed the installation of transmission lines in Neskowin.

Bids have been opened for 12 street and sewer projects located in various parts of the city of Portland.

A new blacksmith shop and second hand store will soon be opened in the W. C. Rose building at Coquille.

The Medford Logging Co. at Butte Falls will survey a railway from the Falls into Klamath county.

The remodeled dance pavilion of Moose Lodge at Klamath Falls has been opened to public at Klamath Falls.

The construction of a planing mill at Glendale, is being built by Glendale Lumber Company, fast nearing completion.

The "Eyerly" plane, the product of Eyerly Aircraft Company at Salem, won Portland to Silverton air derby race.

Oakland's municipal electric and water systems purchased by California Oregon Power Company for sum of \$25,000.

The Southern Pacific Railroad Co. will expend \$750,000 on improving the line in Eugene and Springfield during next few years.

A new building will be erected, and additional machinery installed to

take care of the expansion of the Vernonia Eagle newspaper business.

The lowest bid on the 45-mile lateral system of the Harper and Little Valley unit of the Government irrigation project near Vale was \$95,921.

Shingle mill has been constructed near Sandy at Cedar Creek. Operations will start soon with a capacity of between 35,000 to 40,000 feet per day.

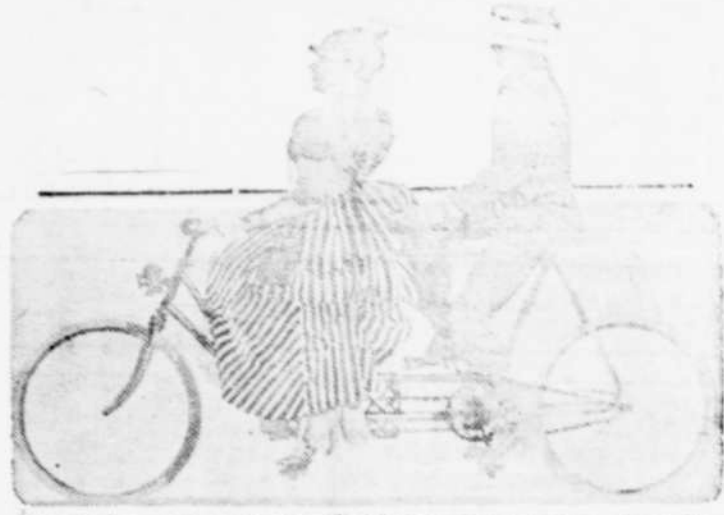

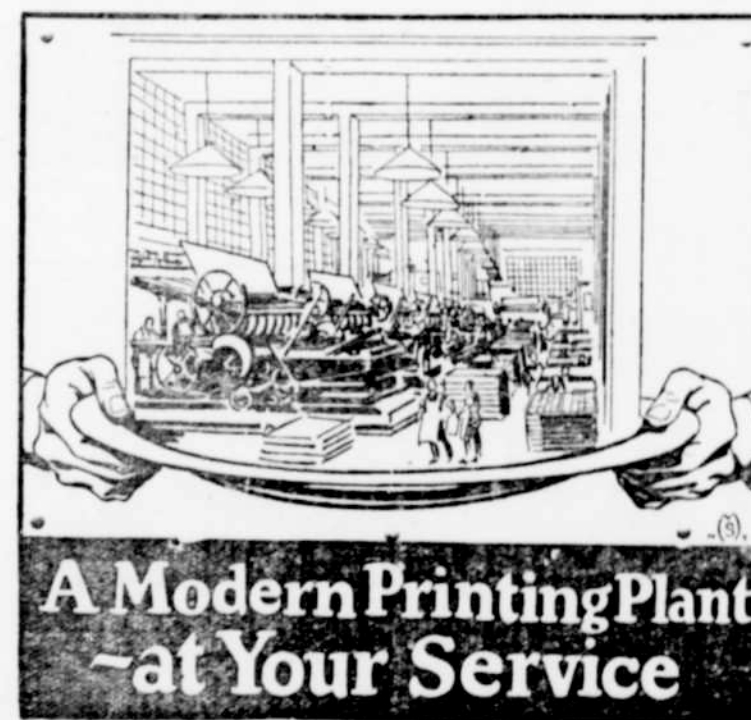
