It takes place on the last night in August and is the Round-Up Dress-Up parade, in which marches every he-man citizen in town. And every man of em is garbed in Western togs; the summer straw or felt has been replaced by a tenebrous cowboy hat, the shirt worn with prosaic business attire is distinctly not the mode and in its stead is donned a flamboyant creation really be-dazzling in its splendor. And with these shirts are worn vests of buckskin, beautifully beaded—neckchiefs—boots of hand carved leather—altogether, the attire is that of the West where men are men and rodeos are Round-Ups.

The parade presages the coming of the Round-Up season and until the close of the four day show, September 18, 19, 20 and 21 the Western attire will be official. All business men adopt it and the wearing of an ordinary sky-piece or pallid shirt in Pendleton during September is as rare as a Chinaman sporting whiskers.

As for the Round-Up for which Pendletonians are getting into their glad rags, it's coming on apace and there's a whole heap of preparation going on. Fifty Round-Up guests from Texas have arrived and are now roaming the hills waiting for opening day; the half hundred are Texas steers who will do their bit to make it interesting for the cowboys in the bull-dogging and steer roping. The Round-Up buckers which have had a year of untrammelled freedom in which to concoct new deviltries, will be brought in from the hills, September 1 and various aggregations or performers will bring in their fine racing stock a week or so before the show.

Prominent Officials Visit Local Kiwanis

Noyes Asks That The Market Road Be Joined To
One from Wilsonville

DE FRANCE PRESENT

Scoutmaster Gives Short Resume of
Work He Is Engaged In

The Beaverton Kiwanis Club seems to be growing ever more and more popular. This week at their regular meeting they entertained eight visitors besides their regular members.

Among the visitors were County Market Road Engineer De France, who told the members of the progress made by his department in getting things lined up for the new market road that will connect this place with our neighbor to the south and east, Tigard. He stated that so far as the Scholls-Ferry road, the right-of-way seemed to have been secured at little or no expense to the county. That the people affected were more than willing to meet the County half way in granting anything that would promote the building of the road. The matter seemed to hang just now on where entrance to Tigard would be affected.

C. W. Noyes, Justice of the Peace and secretary to the Tigard Chamber of Commerce was also present at the meeting and asked that consideration be given to the linking up of the proposed market road with the one coming north out of Wilsonville, through Tuasatin and then north, this being what he thought a part of the projected super-highway from Salem to Portland.

Coming as this did on the eve of the Beaverton "Tunnel Day" to be held at Champoege Park next Sunday, August 25, it brought out that if anyone wanted to drive to that historic place to enjoy the program being put on there Sunday, they might do well to go by way of the market road already established from Tigard and thus become somewhat acquainted with the situation.

Engineer DeFrance made a request that as many as could conveniently do so meet him in Tigard next Tuesday, August 27, at three in the afternoon to go over the different routes where the road above mentioned could be got into Tigard with the least damage and the greatest advantage.

ONLY FIVE-RING CIRCUS IS COMING SOON
